## Exports recover in February

Seasonally adjusted trade for January 2004 decreased relative to December 2003 - exports decreased from $€ 6,977 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 6,679 \mathrm{~m}(-4 \%)$ and imports decreased from $€ 4,180 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 3,805 \mathrm{~m}(-9 \%)$. The corresponding first estimates for February 2004 trade are exports of $€ 7,210 \mathrm{~m}$, up $€ 531 \mathrm{~m}$ on January 2004 and imports of $€ 3,740 \mathrm{~m}$, down $€ 65 \mathrm{~m}$.

On an unadjusted basis, the value of exports in January 2004 (see Table 1) was $€ 6,212 \mathrm{~m}$, down $€ 151 \mathrm{~m}(-2 \%)$ on January 2003, while the value of imports was $€ 3,817 \mathrm{~m}$, down $€ 235 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $-6 \%$ ). The corresponding first estimates for February 2004 are exports of $€ 6,880 \mathrm{~m}$, an increase of $€ 450 \mathrm{~m}$ and imports of $€ 3,680 \mathrm{~m}$, a decrease of $€ 167 \mathrm{~m}$.

A comparison of the January 2004 figures with January 2003 shows that (see Tables 3-4):

- Exports decreased from $€ 6,363 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 6,212 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $-2 \%$ ). Exports of Computer equipment decreased from $€ 1,203 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 1,126 \mathrm{~m}(-6 \%)$ and of Electrical machinery and parts from $€ 431 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 393 \mathrm{~m}(-9 \%)$. Exports of Essential oils (including those used in the food and drink industries) increased from $€ 262 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 346 \mathrm{~m}(+32 \%)$ and of Medical and pharmaceutical products from $€ 998 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 1,031 \mathrm{~m}(+3 \%)$.
- Exports to Great Britain decreased from $€ 1,072 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 965 \mathrm{~m}(-10 \%)$ and to the USA from $€ 1,602 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 931 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $-42 \%$ ). Exports to Belgium increased from $€ 480 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 1,010 \mathrm{~m}(+111 \%)$ and to the Netherlands from $€ 271 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 322 \mathrm{~m}(+19 \%)$.
- Imports decreased from $€ 4,052 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 3,817 \mathrm{~m}(-6 \%)$. Imports of Computer equipment decreased from $€ 738 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 577 \mathrm{~m}(-22 \%)$ and of Medical and pharmaceutical products from $€ 230 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 109 \mathrm{~m}(-53 \%)$. Imports of Other transport equipment (including aviation) increased from $€ 16 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 114 \mathrm{~m}$ and of Organic chemicals from $€ 136 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 221 \mathrm{~m}(+62 \%)$.
- Imports from Great Britain decreased from $€ 1,119 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 1,040 \mathrm{~m}(-7 \%)$. Imports from China increased from $€ 178 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 210 \mathrm{~m}(+18 \%)$ and from Japan from $€ 151 \mathrm{~m}$ to $€ 174 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $+16 \%$ ).

## Background Notes

Introduction The statistics are a combination of Customs-based non-EU trade statistics and estimates from the Intrastat Survey of Irish traders involved in trade with other EU member states. Details of non-EU trade have already been published in a separate Statistical Release.

Revisions All figures are estimates. They are subject to revision on the incorporation of late Intrastat and VAT returns and corrections made by traders to Intrastat returns already submitted.

When the results for a particular month are published, the results for the same month in the previous year are revised for the last time and may be considered final. However, further revisions are possible in very exceptional cases.

From July 1996, sales of some software licences previously included in export returns have been excluded. It is estimated that this has reduced exports by about $€ 65 \mathrm{~m}$ a month. These sales are now captured in the Balance of Payments.

Intrastat System The Intrastat system has two components. Firstly, the Intrastat survey itself (conducted by the Revenue Commissioners), in which the larger traders make detailed monthly returns giving information on the quantity and value of all exports to or imports from EU countries.

The total number of traders required to make an import return is about 6,570 while about 2,000 must make an export return. The response rate in terms of number of traders in January 2004 was $87 \%$, covering an estimated $90 \%$ of the total value of intra-EU trade.

The second component of the Intrastat system is the regular VAT return, on which all traders are required to record the total value of goods imported from and exported to other EU member states. This information provides the basis for determining total EU trade for those traders below the Intrastat survey thresholds. It is also used to maintain the register of EU traders.

Estimation The figures in this release include estimates for traders above the Intrastat thresholds who did not make detailed returns for the period and for traders below the thresholds who did not provide aggregate intra-EU trade figures on their VAT returns.

Estimates for Intrastat non-respondents are apportioned to individual commodities and countries whenever previous Intrastat returns are available. Estimates for traders below the Intrastat thresholds are assigned to partner country where possible, but not to commodity.

The estimate of imports incorporates an upward adjustment equivalent to about $1.75 \%$ of total im ports, which is included in 'Unclassified estimates'. This special adjustment arises from the difficulty of comprehensively covering all EU imports through the Intrastat survey system.

The unclassified category also includes certain miscellaneous adjustments.
Price and Volume The monthly price (unit value) index measures monthly price trends relative to the annual levels Indices in the preceding year using value weights relating to that year's trade (Laspeyres index).

The annual index is compiled using value weights for both the current and previous year (Fisher index) to allow for change in the structure of external trade.

The monthly index series should be regarded as interim measures suitable for month-to-month comparisons within a given year. However, when the annual price index is compiled, the monthly price indices are rescaled to make their average equal to the annual index.
