

Exports down in both September and October

Seasonally adjusted merchandise trade for October 2004, relative to September 2004, shows exports decreased by 1% to €6,560m while imports increased by 2% to €4,390m. In September, on the same basis but relative to August 2004, exports decreased by 10% to €6,644m and imports decreased by 1% to €4,309m.

The unadjusted merchandise trade (see Table 1) for October 2004 (preliminary) gives exports of €6,730m, a decrease of 9% on October 2003, and imports of €4.340m, an increase of 3% over the same period. The corresponding September trade was €7.218m for exports, a decrease of €415m (-5%) on September 2003, and $\in 4.154$ m for imports, an increase of $\in 114$ m (+3%).

Comparing the aggregate January to September 2004 figures with the same period in 2003 shows (see Tables 3-4):

Exports increased from $\notin 60,436m$ to $\notin 62,535m$ (+3%) –

- ◆ Medical and Pharmaceutical products increased from €10,218m to €11,365m (+11%); Professional, scientific and controlling apparatus from €2,273m to €2,863m (+26%); Essential oils and cleansing preparations from €3,155m to €3,542m (+12%) and Electrical machinery and parts from €3,822m to €4,200m (+10%) but Computer equipment decreased from $\in 10,508$ to $\in 9,504$ m (-10%).
- Exports increased to Belgium from €7,675m to €9,528m (+24%) and to Italy from €2,547m to €2,802m (+10%). Exports to Great Britain marginally decreased to €9,892m. Exports to Germany decreased from €5,006m to €4,659m (-7%); to the Netherlands from €2,987m to €2,743m (-8%) and to the USA from €12,744m to €12,561m (-1%).

Imports increased from €34,888m to €36,458m (+4%) –

- ◆ Other transport equipment (including aviation) increased from €346m to \in 1,071m; Organic chemicals from \in 1,272m to \in 1,622m (+28%) and Petroleum and related materials from $\notin 1,201m$ to $\notin 1,434m$ (+19%). Medical and Pharmaceutical products decreased from €1,674m to €1,499m (-10%) and General industrial machinery and equipment decreased from \notin 945m to \notin 808m (-15%).
- Imports from China increased from $\in 1,534m$ to $\in 2,040m$ (+33%); from Great Britain from €9,909m to €10,206m (+3%); from France from €1,369m to €1,620m (+18%) and from Germany from €2,556m to €2,752m (+8%). Imports from the USA decreased from €5,340m to €5,180m (-3%) and from Japan from €1,732m to €1,593m (-8%).





Background Notes

- **Introduction** The statistics are a combination of Customs-based non-EU trade statistics and estimates from the Intrastat Survey of Irish traders involved in trade with other EU member states. Details of non-EU trade have already been published in a separate Statistical Release.
 - **Revisions** All figures are estimates. They are subject to revision on the incorporation of late Intrastat and VAT returns and corrections made by traders to Intrastat returns already submitted.

When the results for a particular month are published, the results for the same month in the previous year are revised for the last time and may be considered final. However, further revisions are possible in very exceptional cases.

Intrastat System The Intrastat system has two components. Firstly, the Intrastat survey itself (conducted by the Revenue Commissioners), in which the larger traders make detailed monthly returns giving information on the quantity and value of all exports to or imports from EU countries.

The total number of traders required to make an import return is about 6,775 while about 2,045 must make an export return. The response rate in terms of number of traders in September 2004 was 88%, covering an estimated 94% of the total value of intra-EU trade.

The second component of the Intrastat system is the regular VAT return, on which all traders are required to record the *total* value of goods imported from and exported to other EU member states. This information provides the basis for determining total EU trade for those traders below the Intrastat survey thresholds. It is also used to maintain the register of EU traders.

Estimation The figures in this release include estimates for traders above the Intrastat thresholds who did not make detailed returns for the period and for traders below the thresholds who did not provide aggregate intra-EU trade figures on their VAT returns.

Estimates for Intrastat non-respondents are apportioned to individual commodities and countries whenever previous Intrastat returns are available. Estimates for traders below the Intrastat thresholds are assigned to partner country where possible, but not to commodity.

The estimate of imports incorporates an upward adjustment equivalent to about 1.75% of total imports, which is included in 'Unclassified estimates'. This special adjustment arises from the difficulty of comprehensively covering all EU imports through the Intrastat survey system.

The unclassified category also includes certain miscellaneous adjustments.

Price and Volume The monthly price (unit value) index measures monthly price trends relative to the annual levels in the preceding year using value weights relating to that year's trade (Laspeyres index).

The annual index is compiled using value weights for both the current and previous year (Fisher index) to allow for change in the structure of external trade.

The monthly index series should be regarded as interim measures suitable for month-to-month comparisons within a given year. However, when the annual price index is compiled, the monthly price indices are rescaled to make their average equal to the annual index.
