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Introduction and Summary of Results

The Household Budget Survey

This report presents detailed results from the 2009-2010 Household Budget Survey (HBS) which was undertaken between August 2009 and September 2010. It supplements the preliminary report from the Survey, which was published in March 2012. The HBS is a survey of a representative random sample of all private households in the State and HBS surveys have been carried out periodically in Ireland since 1951¹.

The main purpose of the HBS is to determine in detail the pattern of household expenditure in order to update the weighting basis of the Consumer Price Index. The maintenance of a detailed diary of household expenditure over a two-week period by the surveyed households is thus the main distinguishing feature of the HBS. Detailed information is also collected on all sources of household income and on a range of household facilities.

The reliability of the results depends to a large extent on the accuracy, reliability and completeness of the information provided by the respondents. Estimates for certain types of expenditure (e.g. alcohol and tobacco) and some categories of income tend to be underestimated in surveys of this nature and thus caution should be exercised in making comparisons between different categories of households. Notwithstanding these shortcomings, the HBS provides a wealth of valuable information on the income and expenditure of Irish households.

The 2009-2010 survey

In the 2009-2010 survey, 5,891 households participated in the HBS. This represented a response rate of just under 40%, a decrease of 7 percentage points from the rate achieved in the 2004-2005 HBS. This reflects the increasing difficulty in achieving a high response for an intense survey such as the HBS. As in previous surveys, the results have been re-weighted to reduce the impact of any biases due to differential non-response between different categories of households.

The field-work for the HBS was undertaken by a specially recruited team of five temporary full-time field supervisors and 50 temporary part-time interviewers. The CSO would like to acknowledge the dedicated work of the field-force and to express its gratitude to the households that participated in the survey.

Summary of Results

The main points of note from this report are outlined below:

- The estimated average weekly expenditure in 2009-2010 for all households in the state was €810.61. This was just 3% higher than the €787.12 figure recorded five years earlier (see Table A).
- The proportion of total household expenditure that related to expenditure on *Food* dropped from 18.1% in 2004-2005 to 16.2% in 2009-2010, whereas the proportion related to *Housing* increased from 12.0% to 18.2%, over this five year period (see Table A and Chart 1). The 2009-2010 survey was the first HBS where the reported proportion of total household expenditure for *Housing* exceeded that for *Food* (see Table B and Chart 2).
- Expenditure on *Transport* decreased by just over 5% from €122.74 per week in 2004-2005 to €116.31 five years later (see Table A). This was due to a decrease in expenditure on car purchases from €47.44 per week to €30.25 over the five year period (see Table 1). There was a 14.3% increase in expenditure on *Transport* when expenditure on car purchases was excluded.
- Expenditure on Alcoholic drink and tobacco decreased by 16.3% (from €47.18 per week to €39.48). In 2004-2005 just over 32% of total expenditure on alcohol related to expenditure on alcohol consumed at home but by 2009-2010 this percentage had increased to just over 41% (see Table 1).
- The average gross weekly household income for the state in 2009-2010 was €1,026.77, which was almost 4% higher than the €987.96 figure five years earlier. Average weekly household disposable income (which is arrived at after the deduction of income tax and social insurance from gross income) increased by just over 5% from €842.98 to €885.72 over the five year period (see Table P).

Eight large-scale surveys have been undertaken in respect of the periods 1951-52, 1965-66, 1973, 1980, 1987, 1994-95, 1999-2000 and 2004-05. The 1951-52 and the 1965-66 surveys were, however, restricted to Urban areas. The 1973, 1980, 1987, 1994-95, 1999-2000 and 2004-2005 surveys covered both Urban and Rural households.

- Total weekly direct income decreased by 6.1% from €862.55 to €809.56 (see Table P). This decrease was more than offset by the increase in state transfer payments over the five year period, which increased by 73.2% from €125.41 per week to €217.20 and accounted for 21.2% of gross income in 2009-2010 compared with 12.7% five years earlier.
- The average weekly disposable income of households in the highest gross household income decile increased by 2.6% from the €2,232.01 in 2004-2005 to €2,289.38 in 2009-2010 whereas disposable income in the lowest income decile increased by 18.8% from €158.99 in 2004-2005 to €188.91 five years later (see Table Q).
- In 2009-2010 almost 66% of households indicated having internet access compared with just over 42% five years earlier. In 2009-2010, 96% of households had at least one household member who had a mobile phone compared with 84.3% in 2004-2005. On the other hand the percentage of households with a fixed landline decreased from almost 86% in 2004-2005 to just over 70% five years later (see Table X). There was a large increase in the number of households with two or more television sets from just under 49% in 2004-2005 to almost 65% in 2009-2010 (see Table Y).

Household Expenditure

Average weekly household expenditure almost €811, an increase of 3% in five years

The estimated average weekly expenditure in 2009-2010 for all households in the state was \in 810.61. This was just 3% higher than the \in 787.12 figure recorded five years earlier (*see Table A*). The corresponding increase in retail price levels, as recorded by the Consumer Price Index, was just over 7%. As a result, there was a real decrease of approximately 4% in the volume of average household consumption over this five-year period.

Comparison of average weekly expenditure in 2009-2010 with figures recorded five years earlier shows a significant increase in two of the nine commodity groups¹ (see Table A above). The highest percentage increase (56.3%) was recorded for *Housing*, where average weekly expenditure increased from \in 94.51 to \in 147.73. Increased expenditure on mortgage and rent accounted for \notin 46.56 of this \notin 53.22 increase (see Table 1).

Average weekly expenditure on *Fuel & light*, at €35.35 was 15.3% higher than the €30.65 figure recorded five years earlier. This increase was mainly due to expenditure on electricity and gas which increased from €17.89 to €24.29 per week over the five year period.

Expenditure on *Alcoholic drink and tobacco* decreased by 16.3%. While expenditure on tobacco showed an increase of ≤ 0.90 per week, (from ≤ 12.19 in 2004-2005 to ≤ 13.09 five years later), alcohol expenditure decreased by almost 25% (from ≤ 34.99 to ≤ 26.40 per week) over this five year period. In 2004-2005 just over 32% of the total expenditure on alcohol related to expenditure on alcohol consumed at home. By 2009-2010, this percentage had increased to just over 41%.

Expenditure on *Transport* decreased by 5.2% from \in 122.74 per week to \in 116.31 (see *Table A*). This was due to a decrease in expenditure on car purchases from \in 47.44 to \in 30.25 per week over the five year period (a decrease of just over 36%). There was a 14.3% increase in expenditure on *Transport* when expenditure on cars was excluded from *Transport* costs. Expenditure on petrol and diesel increased by over \in 8 per week over the five year period, from \in 28.70 a week in 2004-2005 to \in 36.92 in 2009-2010.

The proportion of total household expenditure relating to expenditure on *Alcoholic drink and tobacco* dropped from 6% in 2004-2005 to just under 5% in 2009-2010. The proportion relating to expenditure on *Food* dropped from 18.1% to 16.2%, whereas the proportion relating to *Housing* increased from 12.0% to 18.2%, over this five year period (see *Table A and Chart 1*).




Chart 1: Percentage distribution of average weekly household expenditure, 2004-2005 and 2009-2010

Large increase in *Housing* expenditure in the last 30 years

In 1980 the largest proportion of total household expenditure related to expenditure on *Food* at 27.7% but by 2009-2010 this had dropped to 16.2%. On the other hand, the proportion of expenditure on *Housing* increased from 7.2% in 1980 to 18.2% in 2009-2010 (see Table B and Chart 2).

The proportion of total expenditure for *Food* has shown a steady decline over the last thirty years whereas most of the proportional increase for *Housing* occurred during the ten year period 1999-2000 to 2009-2010. During this period the percentage of total expenditure spent on *Housing* increased from 9.6% to 18.2%.

In 1980, Housing expenditure, as a proportion of total household expenditure, was ranked sixth after Food, Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure, Transport, Clothing and footwear and Alcoholic drink and tobacco. However by 2009-2010, Housing expenditure was ranked second after Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure. The 2009-2010 survey was the first HBS where the proportion of total household expenditure for Housing (18.2%) exceeded that for Food (16.2%).

The proportion of expenditure for Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure increased from 20.5% to 31.3% over the thirty year period. A detailed breakdown of expenditure items included in the commodity group Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure is provided in Tables 1-8 and includes expenditure on medical, childcare, education, pensions and telephone.

In 1980 medical related expenditure (e.g. expenditure on doctors, dentists, medicines and health insurance) accounted for 1.8% of total household expenditure as against 4.6% thirty years later. Telephone related expenditure was less than 1% of total expenditure in 1980 compared with just over 3% in 2009-2010. In 1980 pension contributions accounted for just under 1% of total expenditure but this had risen to almost 5% thirty years later.




Chart 2: Changes in distribution of total household expenditure,

Households owned with a mortgage spent the most

Households owned with a mortgage spent the most, at €1,132.34 per week, while households rented from a local authority spent the least at €448.66 per week. Households owned with a mortgage spent the most on each of the 9 commodity groups (see Table C). These differences in expenditure reflect corresponding variations in household size, income levels and activity composition. For example, households owned with a mortgage were larger in size than other household types at 3.32 persons per household compared with the state average of 2.78 and almost 90% of households owned with a mortgage had at least one household member who was self-classified as working, whereas the corresponding percentage for households rented from a local authority was just under 32% (see Table 4).

Households owned with a mortgage and those rented from private owners had much higher average weekly *Housing* expenditure (≤ 255.15 and ≤ 176.87 respectively) than other households (e.g. ≤ 25.31 for rent free households), as mortgage and rent payments are included in the *Housing* expenditure commodity group (see Table 4).

As a proportion of total household expenditure, households rented from a local authority spent notably more on *Food* and on *Alcoholic drink and tobacco* than other households (see Table D and Chart 3). Food expenditure in households rented from a local authority accounted for just over 21% of their total household expenditure, compared with almost 14% of total expenditure in households owned with a mortgage.

Households owned outright and rent free households spent proportionately more than other households on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* (36.4% and 36.5% respectively, compared with 21.5% for households rented from a local authority). A more detailed breakdown of expenditure items included in this commodity group, by tenure status, is provided in *Tables E and F and Chart 4*.




Chart 3: Percentage distribution of average weekly household expenditure for selected commodity groups, by household tenure

Even though households owned with a mortgage spent more in absolute terms on *Housing* than any other household type, as a proportion of total household expenditure households rented from private owners spent the most. Over 26% of the total expenditure of households rented from private owners related to *Housing* whereas the corresponding percentage for households owned with a mortgage was 22.5%.

Households owned with a mortgage spent the most on *Medical* at \in 51.27 per week compared with \in 6.36 for households rented from a local authority (see Table E). Almost 22% of persons in households owned with a mortgage had a medical or GP visit card, whereas just over 87% of persons in households rented from a local authority had a medical or GP visit card (see Table 4). This may explain the higher *Medical* expenditure in households owned with a mortgage.

Households owned with a mortgage spent the most on *Pension contributions* at \in 71.52 per week versus \in 3.43 for households rented from a local authority (*see Table E*). In almost 90% of households owned with mortgage there was at least one household member who was self-classified as working, whereas the corresponding percentage in households rented from a local authority was just under 32% (*see Table 4*).

Households owned with a mortgage spent the most on *Childcare* at \in 14.58 per week compared with \in 1.90 for households owned outright. These households had the highest number of children under 14 years old (0.92 children per household compared with 0.2 for households owned outright). Over 52% of households owned with a mortgage had 2 or more members who were self-classified as working. This percentage was much higher than in any of the other household types (*see Table 4*) and may be a contributing factor in the higher childcare costs of this group. Rent free households spent the most on *Holidays* (\in 20.58 per week, compared with \in 4.91 for households rented from a local authority for example).





Even though households owned with a mortgage spent notably more in absolute terms on *Phone* than households rented from a local authority (\leq 31.37 per week versus \leq 17.98), *Phone* expenditure as a proportion of the total expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* for households rented from a local authority was greater at 18.6% compared with 8.6% (see Table F and Chart 4). In proportional terms households rented from a local authority also spent more on *Television* (10.4% compared with 3.4% for households owned outright for example).

As a proportion of total expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure,* households owned outright spent the most on *Medical* (18.2% versus 6.6% for households rented from a local authority). Households owned with a mortgage spent most on *Pension contributions* (19.7% compared with 3.5% for households rented from a local authority) and households rented from private owners spent most on *Education and training* (10.7% compared with 2.7% for households rented from a local authority).

Households rented from a local authority spent most on takeaways

In addition to shop-purchased food items, expenditure on *Food* includes expenditure on meals away from home, takeaways and own garden/farm produce. As a proportion of total food expenditure relating to food consumed at home (excluding own garden/farm produce), households owned outright spent the most on *Uncooked meat and fish* (19.9% compared with 12.4% for households rented from private owners). Households rented from a local authority had the highest proportional spend on *Takeaways* (10.5% versus 5.2% for households owned outright) and on *Soft drinks* (6.3% compared with 3.1% for households owned outright). Rent free households spent more on *Fresh fruit and vegetables* (13.5% compared with 9.2% for households rented from a local authority) (see *Chart 5*).




Chart 5: Percentage distribution of average weekly food¹ expenditure (excl. meals away from home & own garden produce), by household tenure

Urban households spent more than their rural counterparts

Households in urban areas spent more at \in 832.66 per week compared with \in 773.38 for rural households¹. As a proportion of total household expenditure, urban households spent more than rural households on *Housing* at 19.6% compared with 15.7% (see Table G and Chart 6). This was principally due to higher expenditure on rent and mortgage in urban areas. Urban households' average weekly expenditure on rent and mortgage was \in 122.81 compared with \in 78.67 in rural households (see Table 1).

As a proportion of total household expenditure, rural households spent more on *Food* (17.2% compared with 15.6% for urban areas). Rural households were larger in size (average household size 2.95 persons per household compared with 2.69 persons per household in urban households), which may explain why rural household *Food* expenditure was greater.

Urban households spent more than rural households on public transport and air travel, but despite this, rural household expenditure on *Transport* was greater, in both Euro (≤ 127.01 per week compared with ≤ 109.97) and percentage (16.4% compared with 13.2%) terms. Rural households have a greater reliance on private transport than their urban counterparts and average weekly expenditure on petrol and diesel was ≤ 15.31 more in rural areas (≤ 46.53 per week), than in urban areas (≤ 31.22 per week). Expenditure on cars, car maintenance, vehicle tax and insurance was also higher in rural areas (*see Table 1*).




Chart 6: Percentage distribution of average weekly household expenditure, by location

The more detailed expenditure data provided in *Table 1* illustrates some further differences between urban and rural households. For example, in rural households average weekly expenditure on *Fuel and light* (€39.21 per week) was €6.15 per week more than in urban areas (€33.06). Rural households spent almost three times as much as their urban counterparts on central heating oil and solid fuels (€18.71 per week versus €6.53).

Urban households spent more on *Pension contributions*, €44.12 per week compared with €33.96 for rural households. Urban households also spent more on *Education and training* (€17.35 per week compared with €10.82 for rural households), on *Holiday* (€17.67 compared with €12.27 for rural households) and on *Sports and leisure activities* (€15.63 per week compared with €12.33 for rural households) (*see Table H*).

Rural households spent more on *Charitable donations* (\in 5.37 per week compared with \in 3.83 for urban households) and on *Money to other Irish households* (\in 11.35 per week compared with \in 9.89 for urban households). This difference was mostly due to support payments made by rural households for students in third level education living away from home.

A more detailed analysis of *Food* expenditure shows that as a proportion of the total expenditure on food consumed at home, urban households spent more on *Takeaways* (8.7% compared with 6.3% for rural households). However, rural households spent more on *Uncooked meat and fish* (17.7% versus 15.8%) (see Chart 7).




Chart 7: Percentage distribution of average weekly food¹ expenditure (excl. meals away from home & own garden produce),

Highest income households spent more than twice the state average

Households in the highest income decile (i.e. those with a gross weekly income in excess of €2,047.67) spent on average €1,716.43 per week, which was over twice the overall average expenditure of €810.61 for all households. In contrast, households in the lowest income decile (i.e. those with a gross income less than or equal to €238) spent just €353.76 per week, which was less than half of average for the State (see Table I). These differences in expenditure, to some extent reflect corresponding variations in income levels and household size. For example, the average household size in the highest income decile was 3.64, whereas it was just 1.34 for those in the lowest income decile (see Table 2).

As a proportion of total household expenditure, households in the lowest income decile spent more on *Food* than households in the highest income decile (18.8% compared with 12.9%) and on *Fuel and light* at 7% versus 2.7% for households in the highest income decile (see Chart 8). While combined expenditure on *Food* and *Fuel and Light* accounted for almost 26% of total expenditure in households in the lowest income decile, this fell to under 16% for households in the highest income decile.




Chart 8: Percentage distribution of average weekly household expenditure - lowest and highest gross household income deciles

As a proportion of total household expenditure, households in the highest income decile spent more on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure*, at almost 40%, whereas it was less than 25% for the lowest income decile *(see Chart 8)*.

Households in the highest income decile spent substantially more than households in the lowest income decile on *Medical*, at almost \in 90 a week compared with just over \in 12 a week in the lowest income decile households. They also spent more on *Pension contributions* at just under \in 188 per week as against \in 2.50 in households in the lowest income decile. They spent almost ten times the amount on *Holiday* (\in 43.13 versus \in 4.37 in lowest income decile group) and their *Childcare* costs greatly exceeded that of lowest income decile households (\in 23.63 compared with \in 0.66) (see *Table J*).

It is noticeable that almost 28% of total expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* in the highest income decile households related to *Pension contributions* but the corresponding percentage for lowest income households was less than 3%. In the highest income group 2.1 persons per household were self-classified as working, compared with 0.13 persons per household in the lowest income group. Almost 6% of total expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* in the highest income decile households related to *Phone*, whereas the corresponding percentage for lowest income households was 16% (see *Chart* 9).



Expenditure on *Bread* only main difference between households in lowest and highest gross income deciles

With the exception of expenditure on *Bread* there were no notable differences in the proportions of the total expenditure on food consumed at home between households in the lowest and highest deciles. Expenditure on *Bread* accounted for 6.4% of the total expenditure on food consumed at home in lowest income decile households compared with 4.7% for households in the highest income decile (*see Chart 10*). This contrasts with analysis of *Food* expenditure, by tenure status and urban/rural location where there were notable differences in the percentage distribution of food expenditure (*see Charts 5 and 7*).




Chart 10: Percentage distribution of average weekly food expenditure (excl. meals away from home & own garden produce), lowest and highest gross household income deciles

Employers and Professionals had highest weekly expenditure

Households where the reference person was an Employer or Professional (Social Group 1) had the highest weekly expenditure in 2009-2010 at \in 1,124.35. This figure was more than double the average weekly expenditure of households where the reference person was involved in Agriculture & other Occupations (Social Group 5) which was the lowest at \in 538.27 per week. As with households categorised by income deciles, the difference in expenditure could be a consequence of relative differences in income. Households in Social Group 1 had a higher income than those in Social Group 5. Also, a higher proportion of persons in the households in Social Group 1 were at work compared with those in Social Group 5 (1.37 vs. 0.4 persons per household) (see Table 5).

Households where the reference person was in Social Group 1 spent more than double what households where the reference persons were manual workers or involved in agricultural or other occupations (Social Groups 3, 4 and 5) spent on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* (€400.22 compared with €192.81, €185.62 and €144.06 respectively).

As a proportion of total expenditure, households in Social Group 5 spent most on *Food* (19.8%) and *Fuel and light* (6.2%). Households where the reference person was a semi-skilled or unskilled manual worker (Social Group 4) spent most on *Alcoholic drink and tobacco* (6.3%) while households where the reference person was an Employer or Professional (Social Group 1) spent most on *Housing* (19.5%) and *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* (35.6%). Households in Social Group 3, i.e. where the reference person was a manual skilled worker, spent the most on *Transport* (15.8%) (see Table K).



As a percentage of the total expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure*, households in Social Group 1 spent the most on Pension contributions (21.4%) compared with 7.6% for households in Social Group 5. Proportionately speaking households in Social Group 5 spent the most on *Medical* followed by Employers and Professionals (Social Group 1) and Non Manual Workers (Social Group 2), both at 15.0%.

While spending equivalent amounts on *Uncooked meat and fish* (16.9%) as a proportion of money spent on food consumed at home, households in Social Group 1 spent the most on *Fresh fruit and vegetables* (13.2%) while households in Social Group 5 spent the least at 10.9%. Households where the reference person was a Manual skilled worker (Social Group 3) spent the least on *Uncooked meat and fish* at 15.1%. Households where the reference person was a Non Manual Worker (Social Group 2) spent most on *Takeaways* (8.6%) compared with households in Social Group 1 which spent the least at 7.1%.

Households where the reference person was an Employer or Professional (Social Group 1) spent on average \leq 41.08 per week on *Meals away from home*. This is equivalent to over a quarter (26.5%) of their total average weekly food expenditure and double the amount of what households where the reference person is a Manual skilled worker (Social Group 3) spent, \leq 20.33 or 15.8% of their average weekly food expenditure.

Retired households spent the least

As in 2004-2005, households where the reference person was Retired continued to have the lowest average weekly expenditure in 2009-2010 at \in 509.41, 62.8% of the national average of \in 810.61. Households where the reference person was Self-employed had the highest at \in 1,052.11. Households where the reference persons were either Self-employed or Retired had the greatest increases in expenditure since 2004-2005, 15.0% and 12.4% respectively. Expenditure for households where the reference person was an Employee remained nearly unchanged, increasing only slightly by 0.2% (see Table 6 and Table L).

Households where the reference person was Unemployed spent on average \in 594.63 per week, while households in the Other category spent on average \in 562.59 despite having average disposable incomes of \in 539.20 and \in 528.14 respectively (see Table 6).

On an absolute basis, households where the reference person was an Employee spent the most on *Housing* (\in 195.50) in 2009-2010, while households where the reference person was Retired spent the least at \in 56.25. This is because a high proportion of households with an older age profile tend to own the property outright. The primary expense for households in this category was on *Capital improvements (e.g. extension and room conversion)* at \in 17.29 per week (see Table 6 and Table M).

As a proportion of total expenditure, households where the reference person was Unemployed spent most on *Housing* (20.9%). Households where the reference person was Retired spent most on *Food* (19.9%), *Fuel and light* (6.0%) and least on *Housing* (11.0%) while households where the reference person was an Employee spent the least on *Food* (14.5%). Households where the reference person was Self-employed spent over a third (34.3%) of all expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* compared with households where the reference person was Unemployed that spent the least at 22.9% (*see Table N*).

Lone parent households' income exceeds expenditure

In 2004-2005, the average weekly expenditure for lone parent households, i.e. households consisting of 1 Adult with children, exceeded that of their average weekly disposable income by \in 54.25 or 112%. The situation reversed in 2009-2010 where expenditure was 98.9% of disposable income. This is due to a decrease in expenditure plus an increase in income wholly from state transfers, as direct income for this category decreased (*see Table 7*).

As a percentage of total expenditure, lone parent households spent the most on six of the nine commodity groups. The exceptions were *Alcoholic drink and tobacco*, *Transport* and *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure*. Nearly a quarter (23.8%) of their total average weekly expenditure was spent on *Housing*. This compares with households comprising of More than 3 Adults spending 13.1% of total average weekly household expenditure on *Housing (see Table O)*.

Households comprising of 2 Adults spent the most on *Uncooked meat and fish* (19.0%) while 1 Adult households spent proportionately the most on *Fresh fruit and vegetables* (13.7%) and *Bread* (6.3%). Households consisting of 2 Adults with 1-3 children spent an eighth (12.5%) of their food consumed at home expenditure on *Milk, yoghurt and cheese*. Households with 3+ Adults spent the most on *Takeaways* (9.3%). Lone parent households spent proportionately the most on *Crisps, sweets and others* (7.6%) and *Soft drinks* (5.6%) while spending the least on *Uncooked Meat and Fish* (12.4%) and *Fresh fruit and vegetables* (9.9%) (see *Chart 12*).




Chart 12: Percentage distribution of average weekly food¹ expenditure (excl. meals away from home & own garden produce), by household composition

Increase in holiday expenditure

The average household expenditure on holidays was €1,986.60 in 2009-2010. This was an increase of €259.36 or 15.0% on 2004-2005 when the average annual household expenditure was €1,727.24. Urban households spent 62.6% more on holidays than their rural counterparts, €2,318.61 compared with €1,425.74 (see Table 9).

As income increased, the proportion of total expenditure spent on holidays increased. Households in the highest gross income decile spent 5.6% of total expenditure on holidays compared with 2.7% of total expenditure for the lowest gross income decile households. Households in the highest gross income decile spent on average \in 5,006.91 on holidays in 2009-2010. This figure is two and a half times the national average of \in 1,986.60 and more than ten times what households in the lowest gross income decile spent, \in 498.66 (see Table 10).

Expenditure on holidays was highest in the Dublin region where the average outlay was \in 2,954.80 for the year. Households in the West spent the least at \in 1,162.81 (*see Table 11*).

Mortgage holders spent most on holidays at €2,614.55 while those who rented from local authority spent the least at €585.86 (see Table 12).

Households in Social Group 1, i.e. households where the reference person was a professional, employer or manager spent on average \in 3,226.97 on holidays in 2009-2010. This is four times what households where the reference persons work in Agriculture and Other Occupations (Social Group 5) spent during the same time period, \in 808.13 (*see Table 13*).

Households spent on average 22.9 nights on holidays with 82.2% of these abroad. Households in the highest gross income decile spent 53.3 nights on holidays compared with households in the lowest gross income decile spending only 6.2 nights. At a regional level, Dublin households spent the most nights on holidays at 32.2 while those in the South-east only holidayed for 15.3 nights on average (see Tables 10 and 11).

Household Income

Average gross household income almost €1,027 per week

The average gross weekly household income for the State in 2009-2010 was €1,026.77, which was 3.9% higher than the €987.96 figure recorded five years earlier. Total direct income decreased by 6.1% from €862.55 to €809.56. This decrease was more than offset by the increase in state transfer payments over the five year period, which increased by 73.2% from €125.41 per week to €217.20 and accounted for 21.2% of gross income in 2009-2010, compared with 12.7% five years earlier.

Average weekly total direct taxation decreased by 2.7% over the five year period (from ≤ 144.98 to ≤ 141.05), while disposable income (which is arrived at after the deduction of income tax and social insurance) increased by 5.1% from ≤ 842.98 to ≤ 885.72 and now represents just over 86% of gross income for all households in the state (see Table P).

Urban households record higher increase in income

Average weekly disposable income for urban households increased by almost 6% from \in 871.43 in 2004-2005 to \in 922.08 in 2009-2010 whereas rural households showed an increase of 3.5% from \in 796.77 to \in 896.29 over this period. At an overall level, the rate of increase in weekly disposable income had slowed dramatically when compared to the increases recorded in previous HBS surveys. For example, weekly disposable income increased by 52.8% between the 1999-2000 and the 2004-2005 surveys whereas the rate increased by just over 5% between the 2004-2005 and 2009-2010 surveys (*see Chart 13*).




Chart 13: Average weekly household disposable income as recorded

Gap between high-income and low-income households narrows

The gap between the highest and lowest income households narrowed in the five-year period to 2009-2010 (see Table Q). Households in the lowest income decile (i.e. those with a gross weekly income less than or equal to €238) had an average weekly disposable income of €188.91 compared with €2,289.38 for those in the highest income decile (i.e. those with a gross weekly income greater than €2,047.67). The ratio of the highest to the lowest household disposable incomes was approximately 12 to 1 compared with 14 to 1 in 2004-2005.

The average weekly disposable income of households in the top income decile increased by 2.6% from the \in 2,232.01 recorded five years earlier, while income in the lowest income decile increased by 18.8% from \in 158.99 to \in 188.91. Due to an increase in the number of persons per household in first income decile households, there was little change in the per capita income of these households over the five year period (see Table Q).


There was a notable change in the demographic structure of households in the first decile over the five year period 2004-2005 to 2009-2010. While over 56% of persons in the first income decile in 2004-2005 were 65 years or older, in 2009-2010 this percentage had dropped to just 24% (see Table 2).

In 2009-2010 there was also an increase in the number of children in the first income decile households. The movement of elderly out of the first income decile coupled with the movement of households with children into the first income decile is partly responsible for the increase in number of persons per household in this decile (from 1.12 persons in 2004-2005 to 1.34 in 2009-2010).

State transfers main source of income for those in lowest income deciles

More than 84% of the average gross household income of households in the lowest income decile was made up of state transfers (*see Chart 14*). The percentage of gross household income made up of state transfers remained above 50% up to and including the fourth decile where 55.5% of gross household income was made up of state transfers.

After the fourth decile state transfers fell to less than half of the gross household income and to under 4% for the top income decile.



Mortgage holders are highest earners

In terms of household tenure, households in accommodation owned with a mortgage reported the highest gross weekly income at \in 1,444.87 (see Table R), which was 2.2% more than that the \in 1,413.51 recorded in 2004-2005. Direct income was the dominant source of income for these households, accounting for 88.7% of gross income (see Table 4).


Households rented from a local authority had the highest increase in gross weekly income at 13.8%. Despite this increase, households rented from a local authority had the lowest average weekly gross household income at \in 516.07. State transfers were the main source of income in these households, accounting for 70.7% of gross income, *(see Table 4)*, whereas in 2004-2005 State transfers only accounted for 51.1% of gross weekly income in households rented from a local authority.


Households in accommodation rented from private owners recorded a decrease of 11% for average weekly gross income. This group showed the greatest decrease in direct income over the five year period from €786.26 in 2004-2005 to €587.42 in 2009-2010.

Income differences reflect the varying activity composition of households across the tenure categories. For example, almost 45% of the persons living in accommodation owned with a mortgage were at work whereas just under 15% of persons living in accommodation rented from a local authority were at work (see Chart 15).






Households in Social Group 1 earn nearly three times those in Social Group 5

Households where the reference person was classified as an Employer or Professional (Social Group 1) had the highest gross household income in 2009-2010 at €1,565.69 per week. This is almost three times the gross income of households where the reference person was involved in Agriculture and other occupations (Social Group 5). They had an average weekly gross household income of €558.75 in 2009-2010. This is due to the fact that only 19.3% of households in Social Group 5 have a reference person in employment compared with three quarters (74.8%) of households in Social Group 1(see Chart 16).

Households where the reference person was employed in non-manual work (Social Group 2) had the largest rise in gross income since 2004-2005, increasing by 17.3% from \in 757.03 to \in 889.97 over the five year period. Households in Social Groups 2 and 3 (i.e. where reference persons were either non-manual workers or manual skilled workers) reported decreases in gross income of 5.3% and 3.0% respectively. Although these groups received increases in state transfers, even doubling for households in Social Group 3 since 2004-2005, these were not sizeable enough to offset their drop in direct income.





Retired households saw largest increase in gross income

In 2009-2010, households where the reference person was Retired had an average weekly gross income of \in 656.85. This is an increase of over a quarter (26.3%) on their reported average weekly gross income in 2004-2005 of \in 520.01. Direct income accounts for 57.6% of their gross income while state transfers accounted for 42.4%. Over 13% of households where the reference person was Retired reported at least one member of the household as at work.

Gross income for households where the reference person was Unemployed had an increase of 15.6% on the five year period since 2004-2005, from \in 482.42 to \in 557.55 in 2009-2010. These households received on average \in 375.39 per week in state transfers (*see Table 6 and Table S*).

Households where the reference person was an Employee had the largest gross income in 2009-2010, at €1,430.62, an increase of 4.8% on 2004-2005 (€1,365.57).


Single adult households make the most gain

Households comprising of just 1 Adult had the largest increase in average weekly gross income since 2004-2005. In 2009-2010, single adult households reported a gross income of €496.56, an increase of 15.7% on the same figure five years previous (€429.33). Households comprising of 1 Adult with children had an average weekly gross income of €514.65, an increase of 6.6% on the relative figure in 2004-2005, of €482.90. Total state transfers contributed to 61.5% of lone parent households' total gross income. This is due to the fact that 62.7% of lone parent households self-reported themselves as either unemployed or not economically active. The same figure was 17.9% for households comprising of 2 Adults with 1-3 children. Gross income increased across all household types with the exception of households with 2 Adults with 1-3 children. Their average weekly gross income decreased by 5.1% from €1,314.07 to €1,247.30 (see Table 7, Table T and Chart 17).

Households comprising of More than 3 Adults paid the most Income tax and social insurance at €194 per week compared with lone parent households who paid €20.51. On a per adult capita basis, households with 2 Adults with




1-3 children paid the most Income tax and social insurance (see Table 7).

Expenditure Compared with Income

Disposable income exceeds expenditure in 2009-2010

In 2009-2010, average weekly household disposable income exceeded average expenditure (\in 885.72 per week versus \in 810.61). In 2004-2005, average household disposable income also exceeded average expenditure. This was a reversal of the trend of HBS surveys conducted prior to 2004 where the recorded average expenditure by households exceeded their disposable income (see Chart 18).



When one compares disposable income and expenditure across the various income decile groups, we see a split in the deciles. The average weekly disposable income for households in the six highest income deciles (i.e. those with a gross weekly income in excess of €784.88) exceeded expenditure. On the other hand, households in the remaining deciles (the four lowest) recorded higher expenditure than disposable income (see Chart 19).




Chart 19: Average weekly disposable income compared with average weekly expenditure, by gross household income deciles

There are many reasons why expenditure may exceed income in lower income decile households and this is a common experience internationally in income and expenditure surveys. Households with recently unemployed household members may draw on savings to maintain their expenditures. Self-employed consumers may experience business losses that result in low incomes, but are able to maintain expenditure by borrowing or relying on savings. Third level students may get by on loans or savings from summer employment, retirees may rely on savings and investments. In addition, across all deciles there may be an under-reporting of certain categories of income (e.g. shadow economy employment income).

Comparing HBS and SILC data

The Survey on Income and Living Conditions (SILC) in Ireland is an annual household survey conducted by the Central Statistics Office (CSO) and covers a broad range of topics in relation to income and living conditions. It is the official source of data on household and individual income and also provides a number of key national poverty indicators, such as the at risk of poverty rate, the consistent poverty rate and rates of enforced deprivation.

The HBS also provides information on income but it is used primarily for categorical purposes (e.g. for analysis of households according to different levels of disposable income) rather than the provision of information on income levels. *Table U* below contains some of the key income distribution and poverty indicators as calculated using income data collected in the HBS. Also contained in *Table U* are the reported values for these indicators from the 2009 and 2010 SILC surveys.

When interpreting these figures it is important to take note of a number of important methodological differences:

The SILC collects income data based on the 12-month period prior to the date of interview (i.e. floating reference period) and makes adjustments for the employment activity of the individual over that 12-month period. The HBS on the other hand calculates income on the basis of the "current income level" of the individual without adjustment for employment activity over the year in question.

Income categorised as direct income and state transfers differ between the two surveys. For example, in SILC employer's social insurance contributions are included in the calculation of direct income while these contributions are ignored when calculating HBS direct income. Occupational pension income is categorised as direct income in the HBS, whereas this income is categorised as state transfers in the SILC. In calculating net disposable income, the SILC deducts regular inter-household cash transfers paid from gross income and the value of regular inter-household cash transfers paid is included in total tax and social contributions. Regular inter-household cash transfers paid are treated as expenditure in the HBS and no adjustment is made to income to account for these transfers.

In conclusion, although income data from the two sources are not directly comparable, calculation of key income distribution and poverty indicators using income data from both surveys resulted in similar values.

The SILC is recognised as the primary source of data on income in Ireland.

Expenditure in at risk of poverty households

The at risk of poverty rate is the share of persons with an equivalised disposable income (including state transfers) below 60% of the national median disposable income. The at risk of poverty rate as measured by the 2009-2010 HBS was 15.5% (see Table U).

As a proportion of total household expenditure, at risk of poverty households spent more than households that were not at risk of poverty on *Food* (19.3% versus 15.8%), *Alcoholic drink and tobacco* (6.3% compared with 4.7%), *Fuel and light* (5.9% as against 4.2%) and *Housing* (19.54% versus 18.1%) (see Table V).

Households at risk of poverty spent \in 533.58 per week compared with \in 863.87 for households that were not at risk of poverty. The difference in average weekly expenditure on *Miscellaneous goods, services and other expenditure* between the at risk of poverty households and those not at risk of poverty accounted for \in 147.63 of the \in 330.30 total difference in expenditure. Households that were not at risk of poverty spent notably more on *Medical* (\in 41.45 per week compared with \in 15.90), *Holiday* (\in 17.61 per week versus \in 5.55), *Money given to other households* in the state (\in 11.62 per week compared with \in 4.62) and *Pension contributions* (\in 47.50 per week versus \in 3.10) (*see Table W*).

At risk of poverty households spent slightly more on *Education and training* (\leq 15.07 versus \leq 14.89 for those not at risk of poverty). The 2009 SILC reported a higher at risk of poverty rate for households where the principal economic state of the head of household was a 'student' than for other categories within this classification (25.9% compared with 5.5% where the head of household was 'at work'). This may explain the higher expenditure on *Education and training* by the at risk of poverty households.

Expenditure on Food, by at risk of poverty status

With the exception of expenditure on *Fresh fruit and vegetables*, there were no notable differences in the proportions of the total expenditure on food consumed at home between at risk of poverty households and households not at risk of poverty. Expenditure on *Fresh fruit and vegetables* accounted for 12.2% of the total expenditure on food consumed at home for households that were not at risk of poverty as against 11% for households at risk of poverty (*see Chart 20*).




Chart 20: Percentage distribution of average weekly food¹ expenditure (excl. meals away from home and own garden produce), by risk of poverty status

Household Facilities

In 2009-2010, almost 66% of households indicated having *Internet* access compared with just over 42% five years earlier. In 2009-2010, 96% of households had at least 1 household member who had a *Mobile phone* compared with 84.3% in 2004-2005. On the other hand the percentage of households with a fixed landline decreased from almost 86% in 2004-2005 to just over 70% five years later. The percentage of households with *Piped gas* and with *Double glazing* also increased over the five year period. (*see Table X*).

In 2009-2010, nearly two-thirds (65.8%) of all households had internet access. This amenity was income related. As income increased so was the propensity to have internet access, 92.7% for households in the highest gross income decile versus 36.0% for those in the lowest gross income decile. Nearly three quarters of households in Dublin had access to the internet compared to just half living in the South-East (see Tables 10 and 11).

Household Appliances

In 2009-2010 just over 77% of households had a *Home computer* compared with 56% five years earlier (see *Table Y*). While there was a slight fall (99.2% to 97.2%) in the number of households with *Television set(s)* there was a large rise in the number of households with two or more TV sets (from 48.7% in 2004-2005 to 64.8% in 2009-2010).

The percentage of households with a *Dishwasher* increased in the five year period from just over 50% to 63.2%. The percentage of households with *Games console* and *DVD player* also increased (see *Table Y*). The percentage of households with *Refrigerator* (i.e. a stand alone refrigerator) decreased from 43.4% to just over 26% over the five year period whereas the percentage of households with *Refrigerator with freezer* (i.e. fridge freezers) increased form 63.4% to 79.4% over the period.

Appendix 1

Concepts and Definitions

Household

A household is defined as a single person or group of people who regularly reside together in the same accommodation and who share the same catering arrangements. The household members defined in this fashion are not necessarily related by blood or by marriage. Thus, resident domestic servants and boarders (i.e. persons paying to share the household accommodation and meals), are included. Any other individual or group of people living in the same dwelling constitutes a separate household or households if they have separate catering arrangements.

The following criteria are applied in the survey to certain categories of persons to decide whether or not they are members of a particular household:-

(i) Family members who permanently live and work away from home are not included in their home household even though they return on holidays, (if they are visiting the home household during the survey period they are treated as visitors and excluded)

(ii) Children away at primary and secondary boarding school are included as members of their parents' households, but older persons receiving higher education away from home, (e.g. at University, Teacher or Garda Training College etc.), are included as members only if they are at home for the full fourteen day period of diary record-keeping (e.g. during vacations)

(iii) Family members working away from home who contribute to the income of their home household are included as members of the household only if they return home at least one night each week

(iv) Family members who do not contribute to the income of their home household and who are regularly away from home for part of each week are included as members of the household only if they spend at least four nights at home each week

(v) Boarders are included in the household only if they reside there for at least four nights a week and have at least one meal each day with the family when they are in residence

(vi) Family members temporarily away on holiday, on business or in hospital are included as members of the household unless they have been away continuously for more then six months prior to the Interviewer's visit

(vii) Visitors and temporary members of the household are included as household members only if they have resided continuously in the household for more than six months prior to the interview. No specific direction is given as to who is to be taken as the reference person of the household. The Social Group of the reference person is used to classify the sample household for the presentation of results and for the reweighting classifications of urban/rural households used in the derivation of results. The weights used are determined by collating the number of co-operating non-farming sample households, with the grossed number of non-farming households from the 2006 Census of Population, in detailed sub-classifications, defined in terms of the social group of the reference person and other household characteristics. Weights for farming households are determined by collating the number of co-operating farming (primary and secondary) sample households, with the grossed number of farming (primary and secondary respectively) households from the 2006 Census of Population.

For this reason it is essential that the concept of reference person used in both the Census of Population and the survey should be comparable. No explicit instruction is given in the Census of Population as to who is to be taken as the reference. It is left to individual households to determine who the appropriate person is. There is no problem in normal family-type situations.

In other cases (e.g. man, wife and a married child with family) decisions made depend on the circumstances and the approach followed in both the survey and the Census of Population is to take the person whom the household regards as its reference person. In cases were the household consists of unmarried or unrelated people the person in whose name the accommodation was owned or rented is taken as its reference person. Where the mortgage/rent is jointly paid, the respondent with the highest income is taken as the reference person. In cases where household members receive an equal salary, the eldest member is taken as the reference person.

Children are defined as household members *under fourteen years of age* for the purpose of classifying clothing expenditure between adults (men and women) and children (boys and girls). Clothing purchased for infants *under two years of age* is classified as baby wear. The principal household composition classification used for the presentation of results is also based on children aged under fourteen years of age. Classifications are also available based on children aged under fifteen, sixteen and seventeen years of age.

Household expenditure

The household expenditure concept used in the 2009-2010 survey was equivalent to that used in earlier inquiries. It is defined as:

- (i) All expenditure incurred by household members with the exceptions of:
 - (a) repayments of personal loans and debts other than house purchase mortgage repayments

(b) regular and ad hoc savings (other than life assurance), and purchases of stocks, shares, other investments and property

- (c) direct personal taxation (i.e. income tax and social insurance deductions)
- (d) business expenses
- (ii) Retail value of home-grown produce (i.e. from own garden or farm) consumed by the household

(iii) Certain payments by employers of health insurance and life insurance premiums and leisure club fees for their employees; household expenses (e.g. rent, electricity etc.) regularly paid by non-residents (e.g. relatives, friends, charitable organisations etc). The estimated benefit-in-kind to employees from the use of company cars is also included in expenditure on new cars.

Income tax payments and social insurance deductions are not included in household expenditure as they are treated as charges on household income. The values accruing under the household expenditure components (ii) and (iii) above are also included on the income side.

In Irish surveys of this type expenditure is traditionally recorded in the diaries on a payment basis, i.e. respondents record individual payments personally made each day even if the goods were delivered previously or are going to be delivered later. Experience has shown that this payment approach is more suited to Irish conditions than the alternative acquisition or consumption methods. The major advantage of the payment approach is that it is a relatively simple procedure for respondents to understand and follow and, as expenditure is recorded almost concurrently with the actual payments, there is less likelihood of errors being made.

Under these payments based diary completion procedures, any goods ordered or delivered but not paid for are ignored unless they are acquired through one of the following credit arrangements:

(1) Hire purchases (i.e. instalment credit)

Hire purchase payments always relate to specific items and expenditure on transactions of this kind are summarised in the survey by combining the instalment payments being made on the occasion of the interview with the cash down-payments made on any articles acquired in this fashion during the three months prior to the interview and the fourteen day period of record-keeping. The weekly equivalent values of these expenditures are included in the average weekly expenditure derived for individual commodity headings.

(2) Budget or credit clubs

These are credit purchase arrangements whereby articles are purchased against regular advance payments. Respondents are asked to list the individual goods acquired through these budget or credit clubs during the fourteen days of record keeping, and they are also asked to list any other acquisitions made during the month preceding the interview stage. The cash price and the date acquired are recorded and the weekly average expenditure value of these expenditures are included in the average weekly expenditure derived for individual commodity headings.

Details of regular household payments (e.g. rent, mortgage repayments, house insurance premiums, electricity, telephone etc.) and personal payments (e.g. licences, life assurance, education fees etc) are recorded in the interview

questionnaire. Retrospective questions generally relating to the twelve months preceding the interview are also traditionally used in the survey for a limited number of major and easily remembered irregular outlays, such as purchases of central heating oil and motor cars, domestic appliances, audio-acoustic goods, work of outside contractors and bulk purchases of solid fuel, private health insurance refunds and holiday expenses. During processing, diary entries relating to items covered in the interview are deleted. Computerised validation checks based on corresponding expenditure code ranges ensure that there are no duplicating questionnaire and diary entries.

The following points relating to the collection of household expenditure data require special emphasis:

(a) Part exchange and second-hand purchases

All payments made in respect of part exchange and second-hand purchases during the fourteen day period of record-keeping are recorded. Only net payments are summarised and any amount allowed for goods traded in or exchanged in part exchange are deducted.

(b) Business expenses

All business expenses are excluded since the survey is concerned only with the expenditure incurred by household members in their private capacity. Where households received reimbursement of utility costs from employers, the household's expenditure on these utilities was adjusted to reflect the reimbursement.

(c) Own garden/farm produce consumed in the home

The quantity and retail value of all home-grown produce consumed (i.e. from the household's own farm or garden) is recorded on a daily basis. Interviewers were provided with measures for this purpose. The combined aggregate value of the weekly equivalent retail value of the produce consumed is included in both direct household income and food expenditure (See items 59 and 284 in the detailed tables).

(d) Expenditure abroad

Total expenditure on holidays of at least two nights abroad is based on replies to a special retrospective question relating to holidays during the twelve months preceding the interview; expenditure on shorter foreign holidays and visits and personal expenditure on business trips abroad continue to be made on the basis of the diary records. In the case of foreign holidays of two nights or more, the expenditure estimates cover all costs incurred (i.e. cost of package holiday, transport, hotels, meals, entertainment, personal expenditure etc).

Household income

Household income includes all money receipts of a recurring nature which accrue to the household regularly at annual or more frequent intervals, together with the value of any free goods and services regularly received by household members (in particular, the benefits-in-kind supplied by employers and listed under 'Household expenditure' heading above) and the retail value of own farm or garden produce consumed by the household. The gross receipts, (i.e. before subtraction of income tax and social insurance deductions) of individual household members are converted to weekly equivalent amounts and combined to give the average gross weekly income for the households.

In the 2009-2010 HBS, more than 92% of household respondents aged 16 years and over supplied the CSO with their Personal Public Service Number (PPSN). In these cases the Department of Social Protection supplied the CSO with detailed information regarding state transfer payments received by the respondent in the interview week and in the 12 month period prior to the interview date. In previous HBS surveys state transfer payments were self reported by the respondents. In cases where PPSNs were not supplied, values relating to state transfers were collected directly from the respondents.

The following sources of household income are distinguished in the detailed table of this report:

(i) Wages and salaries of employees

Each employee is asked to provide particulars of the wage or salary actually received the last time payment was made. The actual gross amount last received is always used irrespective of whether it happened to be temporarily increased by overtime, bonuses etc or reduced because of illness, short-time etc. The gross figure summarised includes income tax, social insurance and all other deductions made at source by the employer. Additions are made to this gross figure to include the weekly equivalent value of any regular bonuses, commissions etc received during twelve months preceding the interview. This heading also includes the gross

earnings of any household member accruing from regular subsidiary employment as an employee.

Persons involved in state training and work experience schemes are generally classified as employees and the payment they receive is coded as a wage since the bulk of these schemes involve working on some project. Only where the training element predominates are persons classified as unemployed or as a student, depending on their own perception of their situation.

Where employees are away from work without pay on the occasion of the interview, the normal wage or salary is ignored and State, trade union or other benefits being received as an alternative are used in the compilation of household income.

(ii) Income from self-employment

Household members working on their own account or in partnership in a business other than farming are asked to state their gross income net of depreciation allowances and business expenses. A zero income is taken when a loss is incurred. This heading also includes the income of any household member accruing from regular subsidiary own account employment; income from any such occasional work is summarised under other direct income.

Calculations for farming income was based on UAA (Utilised Agriculture Area) = The number of hectares of land owned + number of hectares rented in – the number of hectares let out – number of hectares in bog land – number of hectares in woodland – number of hectares in other areas e.g. lakes.

The Farm Accountancy Data Network (FADN code) for the farm was derived from the detailed questions asked regarding the hectares of farmland under different crop types and activity (i.e. stock on farm). The Irish Agriculture and Food Development Authority Teagasc provided the CSO with Standard Gross Margins (SGM) for various activities and FADN code was derived for each farm based on the activity wielding the appropriate proportion of the total SGM. For example, if the SGM for dairy was over 66% of the total, then the farm was categorized as a specialist dairy farm.

(iii) Retirement pensions

The gross amounts (i.e. before any deductions) being received by household members as pensions in respect of previous employment are summarised under this heading. Older people pensions and all other social welfare pensions are treated as state transfer payments.

(iv) Investment income (Foreign and Domestic)

Investment income is estimated on the basis of the gross interest and dividends (i.e. before deduction of income tax) received or credited to household members during the twelve months preceding the interview from stocks, shares and other investments. Net receipts after deduction of income tax at source are grossed during processing on the basis of the relevant rate of deposit interest retention tax (25% in 2009/2010).

(v) Property income

Property income includes the gross rent received by households in respect of subletting part of their accommodation together with the rent or income accruing from other property after the deduction of expenses allowed for income tax purposes. Rent received by farmers from land let is also summarised under this heading.

No allowance is made in the compilation of either household income or expenditure for the imputed rent which owner occupiers could be considered to forego by not letting their dwellings.

(vi) Own garden/farm produce

The average weekly equivalent value at local retail prices of any own farm or garden produce consumed by sample household during the fourteen days of record-keeping is included in household income under this heading and also summarised as household expenditure under the relevant commodities.

(vii) Other direct income

This heading covers other miscellaneous income sources such as annuities, trusts and covenants, trade union sick or strike pay, the value of free goods and services regularly received by household members (e.g. free

meals, food, fuel or subsidised housing received from employers). Payments by employers of health insurance, life insurance premiums and leisure club fees for other employees are included as well as the benefit in kind to employees from the use of company cars.

(viii) State transfer payments

This heading covers actual cash amounts being received on the occasion of the interview in the form of State benefits, assistance and allowances. They are classified as follows in the detailed tables of this report:

- (1) Child benefit
- (2) Older people pensions
- (3) Widows, Widowers & Guardian payments
- (4) Other long term social protection payments
- (5) Jobseekers' payments (including farm assist)
- (6) Carers' payments
- (7) Education grants/scholarships/back to education allowance
- (8) Other state transfers

The value of State benefits in kind (e.g. free health services, home assistance etc.) is not included in either household income or expenditure. Farmers in receipt of unemployment assistance are not treated as out of work, they are always classified as being self-employed.

Gross household income is defined as direct income plus state transfer payments and is used extensively to classify the results in this report. Disposable household income is defined as gross income less income tax and social insurance deductions. Separate estimates are provided for both these concepts in the Tables 1-8 of this report.

Gross household income excludes certain receipts which are generally of an irregular and non-recurring nature. The principal exclusions are receipts for sale of possessions, withdrawals from savings, loans obtained, loan repayments received, windfalls, prizes, retirement gratuities, maturing insurance policies etc. Furthermore, transfers of money between household members (e.g. pocket money, housekeeping money etc.) are ignored since the household is treated as a single unit. The sole exception to this rule is the wage given to a resident domestic servant. This wage is included in household income, but is balanced by the inclusion of the same amount as household expenditure under the heading *domestic services (e.g. cleaners, gardeners & au pair)*. When a household includes a boarder the payment made for board and lodgings constitutes an internal transfer and is therefore ignored. Since boarders are treated as household members their personal expenditure and income are, however, included in the details for the household as a whole.

Social group

Sample households have been classified in this report to the social group of the reference person of the household. Five Social Groups are distinguished. These are defined in terms of the following combinations of the eleven Socio-Economic Groups used in the 2006 Census of Population:

The 2006 Census socio-economic group classification procedures were followed exactly, namely:

- (i) If the reference person is gainfully occupied the social group is determined by his/her occupation
- (ii) If the relevant person is unemployed the social group is determined by his/her usual occupation
- (iii) If the reference person is retired the Social Group is determined by his/her former occupation

(iv) In other cases the Social Group is based on the occupation of the person within the household on whom the reference person is deemed to be dependent; otherwise the reference person is assigned to the residual Social Group 5.

Urban and rural households

Households in Stratum 1 to Stratum 6 (based on the 2006 Census of Population) were defined as Urban households, Rural households were in Strata 7 and 8 (see Appendix 2 below, under Sample Design, for more information on the eight strata).

Health conditions and difficulties with certain activities

Health conditions refer to anything that has affected the respondent in the 6 months prior to interview, or is likely to affect the respondent for at least 6 months thereafter.

Categories of health conditions

- 1. Blindness, or a severe vision impairment
- 2. Deafness, or a severe hearing impairment
- 3. A condition that substantially limits one or more basic physical activities such as walking, climbing stairs, reaching, lifting or carrying
- 4. A learning or intellectual disability
- 5. A psychological or emotional condition
- 6. Other, including any chronic illness

Categories of activities

- 1. Learning, remembering or concentrating
- 2. Dressing, bathing or getting around inside the house
- 3. Going outside the home alone to visit the shop or visit a doctor's surgery
- 4. Working at a job or business or attending school or college
- 5. Participating in other activities, for example leisure or using transport

Definitions

Equivalence scales

Equivalence scales are used to calculate the *equivalised household size* in a household. Although there are numerous scales, the national scale is used in this instance. The national scale attributes a weight of 1 to the first adult, 0.66 to each subsequent adult (ages 14+ living in the household) and 0.33 to each child aged less than 14. The weights for each household member are then summed to calculate the *equivalised household size*.

Example:

A household consists of 5 people: 2 adults and 3 children. The national scale gives a weight of 1 to the first adult and 0.66 to each subsequent adult (aged 14+) living in the household, and 0.33 to each child. Thus this household's *equivalised household size* is 1 + 0.66 + 0.33 + 0.33 + 0.33 = 2.65.

Equivalised disposable income

The disposable household income is divided by the *equivalised household size* to calculate the equivalised disposable income for each individual, which essentially is an approximate measure of how much of the income can be attributed to each member of the household. This *equivalised income* is then applied to each member of the household.

Example:

If a household has a total disposable income of €50,000 and the equivalised household size is 2.65, the equivalised disposable income for this household is €18,679.92. This income is applied to each member of the household.

At risk of poverty rate

This is the share of persons with an equivalised disposable income (including state transfers) below a given percentage (usually 60%) of the national median disposable income (including state transfers). The rate is calculated by ranking persons by equivalised disposable income from smallest to largest and the median or middle value is extracted. Anyone with an equivalised disposable income of less than 60% of the median is considered at risk of poverty at a 60% level.

Gini co-efficient

This is the relationship between cumulative shares of the population arranged according to the level of disposable income and the cumulative share of total disposable income received by them. For example, 20% of the population should ideally have 20% of the total income. If there was perfect equality (i.e. each person receives the same disposable income), the Gini co-efficient would be 0%. A Gini co-efficient of 100% would indicate that there was total inequality and the entire national income was in the hands of one person.

Regions

The regional classifications in this release are based on the NUTS (Nomenclature of Territorial Units) classification used by Eurostat. The NUTS3 regions correspond to the eight Regional Authorities established under the Local Government Act, 1991 (Regional Authorities) (Establishment) Order, 1993, which came into operation on 1 January 1994. The NUTS2 regions, which were proposed by Government and agreed by Eurostat in 1999, are groupings of the NUTS3 regions. The composition of the regions is set out below.

Appendix 2

Methodology

Data Collection/Forms Used in the Survey

The data collection process was carried out by a team of five Temporary Full-Time Field Co-ordinators and 50 Temporary Part-Time Field Interviewers. Each household that participated in the HBS completed a detailed household questionnaire which included questions on tenure status, household appliances, household facilities and housing costs (e.g. mortgage, rent).

Each household member aged 16 years and over completed a personal questionnaire which included questions on income, education, work status and other demographic related questions. Data capture for both personal and household questionnaires was by means of CAPI (Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing). All household members aged 16 and over were also required to fill in a paper diary over a two week period, detailing all expenditure over this period. During the two week diary phase of a HBS, an interviewer returned to the participating household in order to check that household members were filling out their diaries in the correct manner. A copy of the paper diary is reproduced in Appendix 4.

Survey Coverage

The survey related solely to private households. Institutional households, (e.g. nursing homes, barracks, boarding schools, hotels etc.) were not covered by the survey.

A household was defined as a single person or group of people who regularly reside together in the same accommodation and who share the same catering arrangements. The household members were not necessarily related by blood or marriage.

The reference person was traditionally the person in whose name the accommodation was owned or rented and/or who was mainly responsible for meeting household expenses or who had the highest income of the household.

Data Provided by Households

Each sample household was required to:

(a) provide particulars of household membership, accommodation, facilities, amenities and regular household expenses (e.g. rent, electricity, telephone etc.)

(b) have all constituent household members aged sixteen years and over provide details of their income and regular personal expenditure, and also maintain detailed diary records of their day to day personal expenditure for fourteen consecutive days.

Households were accepted as co-operating only if all the required data was provided and each household member aged sixteen years and over kept an expenditure diary. The refusal of one member to co-operate resulted in the whole household being eliminated. These strict participation criteria contributed to the relatively high non-response rates which are traditionally experienced in the Household Budget Survey.

Households involved in farming or market gardening were asked a special farm income questionnaire.

Sample Design and Selection

As in previous Household Budget Surveys, the sample was stratified for operational and economy reasons.

A two-stage sample design was used. This comprised of a first stage sample of 2,600 blocks (or survey areas) randomly selected at county level to proportionately represent the following eight strata relating to population density:

- 1. County Borough
- 2. Suburbs of County Boroughs
- 3. Environs of County Boroughs
- 4. Towns 10,000+
- 5. Towns 5,001 10,000

- 6. Towns 1,000 5,000
- 7. Mixed Urban/Rural Areas
- 8. Rural Areas

The second sampling stage involved the random selection of two independent samples of 3 original households and 3 substitute households for each survey area. The number of original sample households constituted the quota of co-operating households to be realised in each survey area and the interviewer systematically approached as many substitute households as was necessary to a maximum of 3 to realise this quota. In this fashion, variations in response by region and town size were controlled.

The actual number of households for which satisfactorily completed returns were obtained in particular areas was sometimes less than the required quota. This was either because the number of substitute households was not sufficient when the response was low or some of those who initially promised to co-operate dropped out of the survey during the 14 day diary record-keeping and substitutes could not be introduced before the interviewer left the area.

Urban and rural households

Urban households are defined as being located in cities and towns, including their suburbs, distinguished for Census of Population purposes. The boundaries of towns (with a population of 1,000 or more) and their classification by population size were based on the 2006 Census of Population.

Rural households are located outside the boundaries of cities and towns (including suburban areas).

Fieldwork

Fieldwork was undertaken by a team of fifty temporary part-time Household Interviewers and five temporary full-time Field Co-ordinators specially recruited for the survey. Training of field staff commenced in July 2009 with the fieldwork starting in August. It was fully completed by the end of September 2010.

Survey areas were grouped into fifty regional interviewer assignments. Household Interviewers, in as much as was possible, resided within, or adjacent to, the regions they were responsible for. The constituent survey areas in each Interviewer assignment were completed in a specific order predetermined to ensure that the national sample of urban areas, towns of different sizes and rural areas were approximately distributed regionally throughout the survey period.

Household Interviewers were provided with address listings of original and substitute sample households for each survey area - four of each less the farm households (i.e. those with one or more member with farming as a principal occupation) identified at the sample selection stage. For rural areas, they were provided with a map of the townland and approached households in a specified order. In each survey area, Interviewers worked systematically through the listing of original sample households and approached substitute sample households until the required quota of co-operating households was realised.

The survey was concerned with the households resident at the selected addresses on the occasion of the Interviewer's initial visit. Interviewers were not permitted to introduce non-selected addresses into the sample. They were required to secure the co-operation at a regular rate of about three households each week. Interviewers generally had to make two to four separate visits to secure the co-operation of individual household members and to complete the household and personal questionnaires. The expenditure diaries were completed by each household member aged sixteen years and over and Interviewers made at least three inspection visits during the fourteen day period to ensure that entries were being recorded correctly.

Survey Response

A total of 14,835 sample addresses were visited by Interviewers during the course of the survey; 2,391 of these related to vacant or demolished dwellings, boarding houses, institutions and other addresses excluded from the scope of the survey. This left an effective sample of 12,444 households (including those not contacted) of which 6,353 initially agreed to participate and 5,891 persevered to the end of the fourteen day period of record keeping.

The effective response rates for town and country survey areas in the 1999-2000, 2004-2005 and 2009-2010 Household Budget Surveys are compared in the following table.

Inducement to Co-operate

A large scale national publicity campaign was undertaken at the beginning and middle of the fieldwork. An introductory letter was also sent to all sample households prior to the Interviewer's visit explaining the nature and purpose of the survey.

Although the co-operation of sample households was mainly canvassed by Interviewers on the basis of the importance of the survey and the usefulness of the results (e.g. for Consumer Price Index reweighting), response also benefited from a inducement offered to each person aged sixteen years and over in co-operating households in appreciation of their participation. If each person aged sixteen years and over in a sample household satisfactorily co-operated in the survey, they were given a gratuity payment.

Coding of expenditure diaries

All expenditure diaries completed by HBS household members were collected by interviewers and returned to the CSO in Cork. A processing team in the CSO entered details of items listed in the diaries (over 880,000 items) into a data entry system. Each item was assigned a COICOP (Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose) code. Stringent data range checks for each COICOP code were integrated into the direct data entry system for cleaning data and for catching inconsistencies during data entry.

Expenditure in Tables 1-8 is classified by 5 digit COICOP code. Each COICOP code is described by 'Item Description' which aims to best describe the item(s) coded to a particular COICOP 5 digit code. However, in certain cases there may be a large number of items coded to the same COICOP and the 'Item Description' does not list all items.

Deviation of results

The survey results are weighted to agree with the number of private households from the 2006 census of Population. The complete sample is stratified as follows:

- Urban households (towns including suburbs with 1,000 or more inhabitants) Household compositions (7 categories) X Social Group of reference person (5 categories) (see below for description of Household composition and social group categories).
- Rural non-farming households Household composition (7 categories) X Social Group of reference person (5 categories).
- Rural households where farming is the principal activity Acreage (5 categories).
- Rural secondary farming households Household composition (6 categories) X Social Group of reference person (5 categories).

Household composition

This is a classification of households based on the number of adults and children in the household. The categories are:

- 1 adult
- 2 adults
- 1 adult with children
- 2 adults with 1-3 children
- 3+ adults
- · Other households with children

Social Group

Households have been classified to the social group of the reference person of the household. Five groups have been distinguished, defined in terms of the following combinations of the eleven Socio-Economic Groups used in the 2006 Census of Population:

Social Group	Socio-economic Group
1	Higher professional Lower professional Employers and managers
2	Own account workers Non-manual workers
3	Manual skilled workers
4	Semi-skilled manual workers Unskilled manual workers
5	Farmers, agricultural workers All other gainfully occupied and unknown

The 2006 Census socio-economic group classification procedures were followed exactly, namely:

- (i) If the reference person is gainfully occupied the social group is determined by his/her occupation
- (ii) If the relevant person is unemployed the social group is determined by his/her usual occupation
- (iii) If the reference person is retired the social group is determined by his/her former occupation

(iv) In other cases the social group is based on the occupation of the person within the household on whom the reference person is deemed to be dependent; otherwise the reference person is assigned to the residual Social Group 5.

Farming status

Each rural household was assigned to one of three categories:

- Farming is the principal activity Farming is the principal occupation of the reference person or where the reference person is not in the labour force (i.e. retire, engaged in home duties, incapacitated etc.) but farming is the principal occupation of at least one other household member.
- Farming is the secondary activity Reference person is in the labour force (i.e. at work or unemployed) with a non-farming principal occupation and farming is the principal occupation of at least one other household member or farming is the subsidiary (i.e. not the principal) occupation of at least one person in the household.
- Non-farming household The remainder of rural households.

In previous Household Budget Surveys, a sample of households that participated in the Teagasc National Farm Survey was integrated into the Household Budget Surveys. In the 2009-2010 HBS, National Farm Survey households were not integrated into the HBS and the same sample design was used for all elements of the population. The resultant number of farm households that participated in the 2009-2010 was not adequate for reporting HBS results for farm households as a separate category.

Appendix 3

Changes to Survey Questionnaire since 2004/2005

The general methodology (i.e. definitions, scope, coverage etc.) of the 2009/2010 Survey is very similar to that used in the last national Household Budget Survey in 2004/2005. Some minor changes to the survey coverage were made, these are summarised below:

Income

Changes were made to income to reflect changes in taxation since the previous HBS.

Social Welfare benefits

The questions were amended to include any changes to the type and number of Social Welfare benefits provided.

Mortgage

The question was extended to include year mortgage was taken out.

Second dwelling

More extensive questions were asked regarding tenure of second and third dwellings.

Household appliances

The question excluded food processor, deep fat fryer, liquidiser, stereo system, camcorder/palmcorder and satellite system. These had previously been included in the 2004/2005 survey.

The question on televisions was adjusted to cater for updated set types with the question on television rental being removed. The question included ownership of a DVD player.

Telephone

The question was extended to include cable phones.

Mobile phone

The question was enhanced to provide more in-depth information on mobile phones, e.g. internet access.

Licences

The question on licences now includes firearm certificate/gun licence.

Accommodation

The question was extended to include 'A caravan or mobile home on site'.

Household facilities

The question was extended to include air conditioning and burglar alarms and exclude garden/lawn and attic insulation.

General health

The possibility of being asked questions on difficulty doing certain activities was not dependant on the answer to questions on long lasting health conditions, unlike the 2004/2005 survey.

Education

Specific questions on highest educational attainment were asked.

We need to know if fruit and vegetables are fresh, frozen, tinned or dried, and whether potatoes are old or new.

6. Drinks (non-alcoholic)

We need to know if soft drinks are pure fruit juice or juice drinks and whether they are concentrated (eg Kia Ora) or not concentrated and whether low calorie or not.

What to do with.....

Till receipts from supermarkets

If you have a receipt, attach it to the relevant day in the diary. This will save you writing out all the items.

- If it does not describe individual items you will need to write out the items instead.
- If it does not include weight/volume or whether the item is fresh/frozen, chilled, tinned or dried, write the missing information on the till receipt or on the blank diary page with an arrow pointing to the relevant item.
- If there are any items of clothing on the receipt please cross them out and record them at Section 4 'Clothing and footwear'.

Money off vouchers, coupons or loyalty and reward cards

- Check they are shown on the till receipt.
- If they are not, write them on the diary page together with how much they are worth eg '10c off Fairy Liquid' or '200 points = €2'.

Gift tokens and vouchers

These should be treated as if you were paying by cash.

Purchases over the internet

Don't forgot to record anything you order over the internet, such as groceries, flights, books or CDs.

- Record any items ordered during the diary period even if you do not pay for them until later.
- Include orders made where the internet was accessed using a computer, digital TV, WAP phone or games console.
- In the 'Where bought' column please write 'internet', not the name of the seller eg groceries bought from Tesco.ie should be recorded as from the 'internet' not 'Tesco'. If you attach a receipt, please write 'internet' on it clearly.

Money you give to someone

- If the money is a present or pocket money, enter the amount at Section 5 and note whether it is for someone in your household.
- If it is for a specific purpose (eg school dinners or travel fares), also enter the amount at Section 5 and note what it was used for and who it was given to.
- If it was given to someone else to buy something for yourself, it should be entered in your diary as if you spent it.

Gifts and presents bought by you

You need to give a description of the gift or present in the diary. 'Present for Mum' is not sufficient.

Refunds and Exchanges

- If you get a full refund from a shop, friend or relative on something that you have written in your diary, cross out the item and note 'refunded' beside it.
- If less than the full amount is refunded, reduce the amount paid by the amount of the refund.
- If an item is exchanged, cross out the old item and write in the new one.
- If you get or will get a refund from an employer for business expenses incurred in the diary period, enter the details in Section 9 on page 36.

Budget accounts and mail order clubs

- If you make regular payments write 'Payment into budget account' or 'Payment into mail order club' and the amount you pay. Do not record each item you obtain.
- If you pay for something outright by order, record each item and its cost as normal

Hire purchase or credit sale

Note the item and the amount of your payment, and record that it is an HP or credit payment and also whether it was a deposit or instalment.
