


#### Persons aged 15 to 64 years with a third level qualification

#### Almost a quarter of those aged 15-64 have a third level qualification

In the second quarter of 2005 almost a quarter of those aged 15-64 had a third level qualification which compares to just a fifth three years previously (Q2 2002). In 2005, over 325,000 males and 373,000 females had a third level qualification reflecting increases of 22.6% and 24.3% respectively on the corresponding 2002 figures. Excluding 15-24 year olds (the age group most likely to be still in education), just over 28% of the population aged 25-64 had a third level qualification, compared to 24.4% in the second quarter of 2002. See tables 1a, 1b, 2a, 2b and graph opposite.

Almost 40% of all 25-34 year olds declared having a third level qualification in 2005 compared to a figure of just over 34% three years previously. More than 120,000 males and 147,000 females aged 25-34 held a third level qualification in 2005 while the comparable figures for 2002 were 96,600 and 116,400 respectively. See tables 6 & 7.

#### Rise in numbers achieving higher secondary level or above


Over 61% of all persons aged 15-64 attained education levels of higher secondary level or above in 2005. This represents an increase of 4 percentage points on the comparable figure in 2002. This rise was evident for both males and females with the male rate increasing from 55.0% to 58.5% between 2002 and 2005 and the female rate increasing from 60.2% to 64.5% over the same period. See tables 1a & 1b.

Almost 16% of persons aged 15-64 had not progressed beyond primary level education in the second quarter of 2005 compared to a figure of 19.5% in 2002. See tables 1a & 1b.

In the second quarter of 2005, almost 76.0% of persons aged 25-64 were in the labour force. The labour force participation rate for persons with a third level degree or above was 90.4% compared to a participation rate of just 52.6% for persons whose highest level of education attained was, at most, primary. Conversely, the unemployment rate for those aged 25-64 with a degree or above was just 1.8% compared with 7.4% for persons whose highest educational attainment level was primary or below. #### Life long learners in EU member states, Second Quarter 2005



### Almost 12% of 18-24 year olds leave school early

In the second quarter of 2005 the number of early school leavers stood at 54,600 or 11.9% of all persons aged 18-24. Early school leavers are defined as those persons aged 18-24 whose highest level of education attained is lower secondary or below who have completed their formal education. Males are more likely to leave school early than their female counterparts with 14.5% of males and 9.3% of females defined as early school leavers. *See table 9a*.

Almost 57% of the 54,600 early school leavers were in employment while a little over 16% were unemployed and the remaining 27% classified as not being economically active. Early school leavers are three times more likely to be unemployed than to be in employment when compared to all persons of the same age group. Male early school leavers are more likely than their female counterparts to be unemployed: 18.1% compared to 13.3%. *See table 9c*.

The latest available figures for all EU member states were those for the second quarter of 2005. These show that 14.9% of all 18-24 year olds in Europe (EU-25) had left school early at that time. This compares with 11.9% for Ireland, placing the country fifteenth in the ranking list of EU member states. *See table 9b*.


# One third of workforce aged 25-64 has a third level qualification

In the second quarter of 2005, almost 34% of employed persons aged 25-64 reported having a third level qualification, compared to a figure of just under 30% three years previously. Almost 40% of employed females aged 25-64 held a third level qualification while the comparable figure for males was just under 30%. See tables 3a & 3b.

### One in twelve are life long learners

Nearly 8% of the population aged between 25 and 64 were defined as life long learners in the second quarter of 2005. Of these, just over 73.2% were employed, 2.5% were unemployed with the balance (24.4%) classified as not being economically active. The most recent figures for all EU member states relate to the second quarter of 2005. These results showed that on average almost 11% of Europeans (EU-25) aged between 25 and 64 were life long learners. See tables 11a, 11b, 11c, graph opposite and background notes.


### Males aged 15 to 64, classified by the highest level of education attained, March-May 2002 to March to May 2005

■ 2002 ■ 2003 ■ 2004 |||| 2005


#### Females aged 15 to 64, classified by the highest level of education attained, March-May 2002 to March-May 2005







Percentage of persons aged 25 to 34 with third level qualifications classified by sex, March-May 2002 to March-May 2005





### **Background Notes**

#### Reference period

Questions on educational attainment are included in the core QNHS on an ongoing basis.

#### **Purpose of survey**

While the primary purpose of the Quarterly National Household Survey (QNHS) is to collect information on employment and unemployment, it also includes different modules on social topics of interest on a quarterly basis.

### Highest level of education attained

This classification is derived from a single question and refers to educational standards that have been attained and can be compared in some measurable way. Therefore 'successfully' means that any tests, exams, dissertations, thesis etc. must be taken or submitted, and passed.

For example, to have completed the leaving certificate syllabus but not to have actually sat and passed the leaving certificate exams is not considered for our purposes to be 'successfully completed'.

The category **primary** includes persons with no formal education attainment, or whose highest educational attainment is pre-primary. The category **others** includes a small number of not stated responses to the educational attainment question.

#### Early school leavers

Early school leavers are defined as persons aged 18 to 24 whose highest level of education attained is lower secondary or below and have not received education (either formal or non formal) in the four weeks prior to the survey. Note that this indicator is not strictly comparable over 2002 and 2003 as modifications to the questionnaire in 2003 increased capture of information on receipt of education in the four weeks prior to the survey.

#### Life long learners

Life long learners are defined as persons aged 25 to 64 in receipt of education (either formal or non formal) in the four weeks prior to the survey. For issues regarding comparability see paragraph above.

### ILO Labour Force Classification

The primary classification used for the QNHS results is the ILO (International labour Office) labour force classification. Labour Force Survey data on this basis have been published since 1988. The ILO classification distinguishes the following main subgroups of the population aged 15 or over:

**In Employment**: Persons who worked in the week before the survey for one hour or more for payment or profit, including work on the family farm or business and all persons who had a job but were not at work because of illness, holidays etc. in the week.

**Unemployed:** Persons who, in the week before the survey, were without work and available for work within the next two weeks, and had taken specific steps, in the preceding four weeks, to find work.

**Inactive Population (not in labour force):** All other persons.

The labour force comprises persons employed plus unemployed.

#### Participation and Unemployment Rates

The rates given in this release are based on the ILO classification. The Participation Rate is the number of persons in the labour force expressed as a percentage of the total population aged 15 or over. The Unemployment Rate is the number of unemployed expressed as a percentage of the total labour force.

### Principal Economic Status Classification

Results are also available using the Principal Economic Status (PES) classification which was used in the Labour Force Survey and the Census of Population. The PES classification is based on a single question in which respondents are asked what is their usual situation with regard to employment and given the following response categories:

At work Unemployed Student Engaged on home duties Retired Other

This PES question is asked before the sequence of questions used to derive ILO status.

#### **QNHS Social Modules**

While the main purpose of the QNHS is the production of quarterly labour force estimates, there is also a provision for the collection of data on social topics through the inclusion of special survey modules. The selection of the major national modules undertaken to date has been largely based on the results of a canvas of users (over 100 organisations) that was conducted by the CSO in 1996 and most recently 2002. The results of the canvas are presented to the National Statistics Board and they are asked to indicate their priorities for the years ahead.

The schedule for social modules in any given year is based on the following structure:

Annual modules update (Disability, Pensions, Childcare, Accidents and Illness)
EU module (always covered under EU legislation)
National module
Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) Survey
National module
