

Irish Trips Overseas up 61,800

There were 665,500 Overseas Trips by Irish Residents in May 2007 compared with 603,700 in May 2006, an increase of 61,800. *See Tables 1 and 2*.

In May 2007 there were 714,600 Overseas Trips to Ireland, compared with 710,700 in May 2006, an increase of 3,900. *See Tables 1 and 2*.

The breakdown of visitors to Ireland by Area of Residence for May 2007 shows the following:

- ◆ Trips to Ireland by residents of Great Britain increased by 5,200. *See Table 2*.
- ♦ There was a decrease of 3,200 in the number of Trips to Ireland by residents of Other European countries. *See Table 2*.
- ♦ Trips to Ireland by residents of North America decreased by 100, while trips from Other Areas grew by 2,000. *See Table 2*.

Background Notes

Periodicity Monthly.

> Scope Overseas Travel.

All Overseas Travel into and out of Republic of Ireland. Coverage

Data Collection The survey is conducted at Dublin, Cork, Shannon, Knock and Kerry airports and Rosslare, Ringaskiddy, Dún Laoghaire and Dublin ports. Information is collected via interview.

Sample Design A sample of flights and sailings is selected for surveying. This selection is done in such a way as to

> ensure proper representation of airport/port pairing, day and night and weekday and weekend flights/sailings.

> On these flights/sailings, a 1 in 5 systematic sample of passengers is selected and their country of residence is recorded.

> Sample results are grossed up to total passenger numbers travelling for each airport or port pairing,

as provided by the airports and ferry companies.

Where there was no coverage in a survey month for an airport/port pairing, results are imputed on the basis of 'nearest neighbour'.

Sample Size The sample size in the May 2007 Country of Residence Survey was just under 55,000 passengers.

Reliability of Results In 2004 the total number of persons sampled for the Country of Residence Survey (CRS) was almost 585,000. The total number of journeys was almost 23,985,000 giving an average sampling rate of 2.4%.

> Estimation of survey results from data relating to a sample of 20% of passengers for a sample of flights/sailings introduces a statistical variability which would not be present if all passengers from every flight/sailing had been interviewed. This means that the survey results cannot be taken as accurate to the full degree shown in this report.

> The variability is expressed by means of a standard error. This standard error gives the relative size of the 'sampling error' (variability) present in an estimate compared with the estimate itself. In general, estimates can be said to have a relative precision of twice their standard error.

> The effect of sampling error is relatively greater for small estimates and may, in particular, make it more difficult to compare figures for different time periods. The following table gives estimates of the standard error for the major Area of Residence categories. The more detailed country figures in Table 5 are subject to higher standard errors, as a percentage of the estimate.

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In general, the more detailed the classification provided the greater the standard error of the estimates. In the derivation of the results, the assumption was made that non-respondents had similar characteristics and activity levels to those respondents in the same stratification cell. This assumption, which is a standard one in surveys such as this, may have resulted in some slight bias being introduced into the results. Moreover, although every effort was made to ensure that the information received during interview was correct in all respects it is inevitable that some minor non-sampling errors remained undetected.

Seasonal Adjustment

Visitor numbers to Ireland are subject to a high degree of seasonality. These seasonal fluctuations do not affect annual comparisons but they do affect monthly or quarterly comparisons. Typically trips are at their highest during the summer months, although there are also clear peaks around Christmas and Easter. To facilitate interpretation of underlying trends visitor numbers are adjusted to remove these seasonal trends.

The seasonal adjustment method used is the X-11 Arima (Auto-Regressive Integrated Moving Average) variant of the US Bureau of the Census X-11 seasonal adjustment model. Each individual series is adjusted separately to capture the different seasonal patterns exhibited by each visiting group. Seasonal factors are calculated and applied concurrently to each series. Once a year, in January, seasonal factors for the full series will be calculated and applied.

The X-11 Arima variant requires at least 5 years data. The present seasonally adjusted series are based on seasonal patterns from January 2000 to date. The duration is just sufficient for seasonal adjustment; the process will improve as the series is extended.

Definitions

Trips

Eurostat methodology defines a Visitor as 'any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than twelve months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited'. However, as the Country of Residence Survey does not establish the reason for an individual's trip or length of stay, those travelling for reason of remuneration or for more than one year to this country cannot be excluded. Therefore, for the purposes of this survey, 'Trips' includes those travelling for remuneration in Ireland. Commercial Drivers travelling on sea routes are excluded.

Country of Residence

Country of Residence is defined as the country in which a person has resided during the past year.
