

Overseas trips to Ireland increased by 7.9% in 2011

The main results for 2011 are as follows:

Overseas travel to Ireland:

- ◆ The number of overseas trips to Ireland by non residents increased from 6.1 million in 2010 to 6.6 million trips in 2011 (+7.9%). See table 1.
- ◆ The number of nights spent in Ireland by overseas travellers rose by 6.1% in 2011, up from 48 million to 50.9 million. See table 4.
- ◆ Expenditure in Ireland by overseas travellers increased by 0.7% between 2010 and 2011, from €3,556 million to €3,580 million. See table 7.

Overseas travel by Irish Residents:

- ◆ In 2011 the number of overseas trips made by Irish residents fell by 4.2%, from 6.7 million to 6.4 million trips. See table 8.
- ◆ Total overseas tourism and travel expenditure of Irish residents declined by 7.2%, from €5,211 million in 2010 to €4,835 million in 2011. See table 10.

Overseas Travel to Ireland

In 2011, over 6.6 million overseas trips were made to Ireland compared to just over 6.1 million trips in 2010, an increase of 7.9%. The number of overseas trips on cross channel and continental routes rose by 7.7% and 11.1% respectively, while transatlantic routes experienced a decrease of 1.5%. The largest increase in overseas travellers was by Other Europe (excluding Great Britain) residents, who made 238,000 additional trips in 2011 compared to 2010, an increase of 11.4%. The number of overseas trips made by residents of Great Britain increased by 123,000 (+4.4%) in 2011. The largest increase in the number of overseas trips to Ireland by reason for journey occurred amongst those coming for the purpose of holiday/leisure/recreation. These trips rose by 274,000, a rise of 10.9% compared with 2010. (*See table 1*)

The number of bed nights occupied by overseas travellers to Ireland rose by 6.1% in 2011, increasing from 48 million to 50.9 million bed nights. The largest increase in the number of bed nights was in the category Other Europe residents (excluding Great Britain), with an additional 2.3 million bed nights (+10.8 %) between 2010 and 2011. The largest increase by reason occurred amongst those coming to Ireland for Other reasons, which rose by over 2.7 million bed nights from 8.2 million to 10.9 million nights. The number of nights spent in hotels rose by over 1.5 million in 2011. The average length of stay by overseas travellers to Ireland fell from 7.8 nights to 7.7 nights. (*See tables 4, 5 and 6*)

Total overseas tourism and travel earnings increased from €3,556 million in 2010 to €3,580 million in 2011. Excluding fares, expenditure decreased by 0.7%, from €2,976 million to €2,954 million. Of this €2,954 million, 51% was spent by travellers for holiday/leisure/recreation purposes, 22% by those travelling to visit friends/relatives, 16% by business travellers and the remaining 11% by those travelling for Other reasons. Based on the area of residence of the overseas traveller, the most important markets in terms of expenditure (excluding fares) within Ireland were Other Europe (excluding Great Britain) 39%, Great Britain 29% and USA & Canada 24%. Overseas Travel by Irish Residents

The number of overseas trips made by Irish residents fell by 277,000 (-4.2%) in 2011, from 6.7 million to 6.4 million. The number of overseas travellers for the purposes of visits to friends/relatives and holiday/leisure/recreation fell by 176,000 (-10.7%) and 95,000 (-2.3%) respectively. While the number of Irish residents travelling overseas on cross channel routes fell by 135,000 (-4.7%) and continental routes fell by 111,000 (-3.2%), the routes that experienced the largest percentage decline were the transatlantic routes, which fell by 9.3% (-31,000 trips). The average length of stay by Irish residents on overseas trips fell from 8.5 nights to 8.4 nights. (*See tables 8 and 9*)

Between 2010 and 2011, the total expenditure (including fares) of Irish residents on overseas trips fell by €329 million (-5.7%) from €5,801 million to €5,472 million. Expenditure on overseas visits to friends/relatives fell by €136 million (-14.3%) while expenditure on journeys for holiday/leisure/recreation purposes fell by €197 million (-4.8%). When adjusted to exclude fares to Irish carriers, overseas tourism and travel expenditure by Irish residents declined by 7.2% from €5,211 million in 2010 to €4,835 million in 2011. (*See table 10*)

Tourism & Travel Earnings and Expenditure

Table 11 shows the estimated tourism and travel earnings and expenditure for 2009 to 2011. During the period 2010 to 2011, earnings from trips to Ireland (inflow) rose marginally by 0.7%, from €3,556 million to €3,580 million, while expenditure by Irish travellers overseas (outflow) fell by 7.2%, from €5,211 million to €4,835 million. As a result, the tourism and travel annual deficit decreased by 24.2%, from -€1,655 million to -€1,255 million.

Background Notes

Introduction	The data in this release gives details on the number of overseas trips to Ireland and Irish trips abroad. It provides data on country of residence, reason for journey, the average length of stay (nights) and expenditure of overseas travellers to Ireland and by Irish residents on trips abroad.
Ireland	For the purposes of this release, Ireland refers to the Republic of Ireland.
Data Sources	The Central Statistics Office (CSO) carries out two sample surveys of passengers at airports and seaports. These are the <i>Country of Residence Survey</i> (CRS) and the <i>Passenger Card Inquiry</i> (PCI). Data from these surveys are used in conjunction with passenger movement figures supplied by the air and sea transport companies to provide the estimates for overseas tourism and travel in this release. The <i>Country of Residence Survey</i> is a continuous sample survey of passengers (both inward and outward) which provides an estimated country of residence breakdown for passengers entering and leaving Ireland. This distribution is applied to the total passenger movement figures to provide estimates of Irish trips abroad and trips to Ireland by non-residents. Trips to Ireland are categorised into the areas of residence shown in this release.
	The Passenger Card Inquiry is a continuous sample survey of incoming and departing passengers. This survey provides information on the reason for journey, length of stay, expenditure and fare costs, in addition to residency. The results are combined with the overall residency estimates from the Country of Residence Survey to provide the overseas tourism and travel details shown in this release.
Periodicity	Annual
Scope	The length of stay, residency, reason for journey, accommodation type (inbound travellers only), expenditure and fare costs for overseas travel into and out of Ireland.
Coverage	This release provides information on overseas travel into and out of Ireland. The results for overseas travel to Ireland are based on the travel and expenditure patterns of departing non-resident passengers while results for overseas travel by Irish residents are based on departing and incoming Irish passengers.
	Travel by residents of Northern Ireland into or out of Ireland or travel within Ireland by Irish residents is excluded from this publication.
Data Collection	This release is based on the results of the Passenger Card Inquiry. The PCI surveys passengers at Dublin, Cork, Shannon, Knock and Galway airports and at Rosslare, Ringaskiddy, Dún Laoghaire and Dublin seaports. Data on the country of residence, length of stay, reason for journey, expenditure and fare costs is collected from passengers who complete a questionnaire provided by one of a team of Central Statistics Office (CSO) interviewers.
Sample Design	A sample of flights and sailings is selected to facilitate proper representation of airport/seaport pairings (e.g. Dublin-London Heathrow), day, night, weekday and weekend flights/sailings. The PCI card is then distributed by CSO interviewers to all passengers on these flights and sailings.
	Where expenditure or fare data is missing, results are imputed using the ‘nearest neighbour’ imputation methodology. In other words, these expenditures and fares are estimated using the average fares of other observations in the sample with similar characteristics.
Sample Size	The effective sample size for the PCI in 2011 was over 172,000 passengers.

Data Revision During 2010 and 2011 the CSO conducted an extensive review of the methodology used to compile the results presented in this publication. The principal changes include a revision to the weighting and imputation methodology and an extended and more refined editing procedure. As a result, the data which was previously published in respect of 2009 was revised in the 2010 publication.

The following table presents the key data changes between the old and revised 2009 data. Because of the methodological change there is a slight discontinuity with the pre-2009 results.

Definitions

- Trip** In this release, a trip is defined as a completed round journey for any purpose (i.e both tourism and non tourism) taken by a traveller to any overseas destination.
- Same Day Traveller** A traveller is classified as a same day traveller if his/her trip does not include an overnight stay.
- Transit/Transfer Passengers** Transit passengers are defined as those who make a stop at an airport without any particular purpose other than being en route to another destination. These passengers generally do not disembark from their aircraft and are therefore not covered by the Passenger Card Inquiry.
- Transfer passengers or ‘connecting passengers’ are also defined as those who make a stop at an airport without any particular purpose other than being en route to another destination. However, unlike transits, transfer passengers disembark the aircraft and pass through the airport en route to their connecting flight. Such passengers may be surveyed for the Passenger Card Inquiry and are thus included in the estimates for trips and expenditure.
- Country of Residence** Country of Residence is defined as the country in which the person has resided for 12 months prior to interview.
- Total Expenditure** Total expenditure refers to the amount paid for the acquisition or consumption of goods and services for one’s own use or for use by others, for and during trips. It includes expenditure by travellers themselves, as well as expenses that are paid for or reimbursed by others. For example, expenses paid by another person (e.g. gift) or expenses paid directly by the employer for employees on business travel are included. Total expenditure does not include purchases of land, real estate or motor vehicles.

Overseas Tourism & Travel Earnings	Overseas tourism and travel earnings refers to the total expenditure by overseas travellers while in Ireland plus fares paid by them to Irish air and sea carriers.
Overseas Tourism & Travel Expenditure	Overseas tourism and travel expenditure refers to the total expenditure of Irish residents on overseas trips (including all fares) less fares paid by them to Irish air and sea carriers.
Tourism & Travel Balance	This refers to the difference between tourism and travel earnings from overseas trips to Ireland and tourism and travel expenditure on trips abroad by Irish residents.
Rounding	Individual figures have been rounded independently and the sum of component items therefore may not necessarily add to the totals shown.
