2002 Census of Population – Volume 1 – Population Classified by Area

Navan grows rapidly

Navan was the fastest growing large town in the State between 1996 and 2002, while Galway City was the fastest growing city, a further report from Census 2002, released today by the Central Statistics Office, shows.

Census 2002 - Volume 1 – Population Classified by Area presents the final population figures classified by sex for all the territorial divisions in the country (provinces, counties, cities, towns, urban and rural areas, electoral divisions, etc.).

The CSO publication reveals that Navan in County Meath was the fastest growing town between 1996 and 2002 when its population increased by more than a half (51.6%) from 12,810 in 1996 to 19,417 in 2002, a rise of 6,607 persons. This increase compares with an 8 per cent overall rise in the State's population in the same six-year period.

Galway continues to be the city with the highest growth. It had a population (including its suburbs) of 66,163 in 2002, which is 8,800 higher than the last census in 1996 - an increase of 15.3 per cent.

Other large towns which experienced rapid growth *(see table)* include Ennis where the population went from 17,726 in 1996 to 22,051 in 2002, a 24.4 per cent increase, and Drogheda where the population rose from 25,282 to 31,020, a 22.7 per cent increase.

Dublin city and suburbs exceeds one million

Dublin City and its suburbs exceeded one million for the first time with a population of 1,004,614, up 51,922 from the 1996 Census figure.

Major towns within a twenty-mile radius of Dublin, which showed a significant increase in population since 1996, were Celbridge (+30.3%), Naas (+29.9%), Swords (+21.8%), Leixlip (+11.6%) and Bray (+10.8%).

Within a thirty-mile radius of Dublin, the following towns also showed appreciable population gains: Navan (+51.6%), Droichead Nua (+25.3%) and Drogheda (+22.7%).

Moving further afield, within a fifty-mile radius of Dublin, Mullingar (+25%) and Carlow (+23.4%) experienced high population growth.


Wide variation in make-up of constituencies

In 2002, Dáil Constituencies ranged in size from 20,792 per T.D. in Dublin North-West to 28,491 in Kildare North. At a national level, the average population per T.D. increased from 21,844 in 1996 to 23,598 in 2002.

High density in Dublin, low in Leitrim

The overall population density (i.e. the number of persons per square kilometre) for the State was 56. Leitrim had the lowest population density at 16, while there were 21 persons per square kilometre in Roscommon and the same number in Mayo.

Dublin City had the highest population density with 4,215 persons per square kilometre, followed by Cork City with 3,107 and Limerick City with 2,655.
