Introduction

The Household Budget Survey

This report presents final results from the 2004-2005 Household Budget Survey (HBS) which was undertaken between October 2004 and December 2005. The HBS is a survey of a representative random sample of all private households in the State and surveys have been carried out periodically in Ireland since 1951¹.

The main purpose of the HBS is to determine in detail the pattern of household expenditure in order to update the weighting basis of the Consumer Price Index. The maintenance of a detailed diary of household expenditure over a two-week period by the surveyed households is thus the main distinguishing feature of the HBS. Detailed information is also collected on all sources of household income and on a range of household facilities.

The reliability of the results depends to a large extent on the accuracy, reliability and completeness of the information provided by the respondents. Estimates for certain types of expenditure (eg alcohol and tobacco) and some categories of income tend to be underestimated in surveys of this nature and thus caution should be exercised in making comparisons between different categories of households. Notwithstanding these shortcomings, the HBS provides a wealth of valuable information on the income and expenditure of Irish households.


The 2004-2005 survey

In the 2004-2005 survey, 6,884 households participated in the HBS. This represented a response rate of 47%, a decrease of eight percentage points from the rate achieved in the 1999-2000 HBS. This reflects the increasing difficulty in achieving a high response for an intense survey such as the HBS. As in previous surveys, the results have been re-weighted to reduce the impact of any biases due to differential non-response between different categories of households. The 2004-2005 HBS also continued the practice, which commenced with the 1987 survey, of integrating into the survey farm households participating in the National Farm Survey conducted by Teagasc. This allowed farm income to be accurately measured for the purposes of the HBS. A specially recruited team of 5 temporary full-time field supervisors and 50 temporary part-time interviewers undertook the fieldwork for the HBS. The CSO would like to acknowledge the dedicated work of the field-force and to express its gratitude to the households that participated in the survey.

1. Seven large-scale surveys have been undertaken in respect of the periods 1951-52, 1965-66, 1973, 1980, 1987, 1994-95 and 1999-2000. The 1951-52 and the 1965-66 surveys were, however, restricted to urban areas. The 1973, 1980, 1987, 1994-95 and 1999-2000 surveys covered both urban and rural households.

Household Expenditure

Average household expenditure just over €787 per week

The estimated average weekly expenditure in 2004-2005 for all households in the State was €787.12. This was over 36% higher than the figure recorded five years earlier. The corresponding increase in retail price levels, as recorded by the Consumer Price Index, was 15.7%. As a result, there was a real increase of approximately 21% in the volume of average household consumption over this five-year period. (See *Chart 1, Table A*).

For commodity groups the highest percentage increases were recorded for *Housing* (+70.6%) and *Services & Other Expenditure* (+54.8%) while the lowest was for *Drink & Tobacco* at (+7%). Expenditure on *Food* as a proportion of total expenditure fell from 20.4% to 18.1% in 2004-2005. Expenditure on *Transport* also declined over the same five-year period from 16.4% to 15.6%. *Services and Other Expenditure* increased from 25.7% to 29.2% and *Housing* was up from 9.6% to 12.0%. (See *Chart 1, Chart 2, Table A*).

Chart 2: % distribution of average weekly household expenditure, 2004-2005





Chart 3: % distribution of average weekly household expenditure by location, 2004-2005



Urban households spend most


Households in urban areas spent the most, at €819.11 per week in comparison to €735.16 for rural households. As a proportion of total household expenditure, urban households spent more on *Services & other Expenditure* (30.1%) *Housing* (13.4%), and *Drink & Tobacco* (6.3%). In rural households *Food* (19.9%), *Transport* (17.6%), *Fuel and Light* (4.7%) and *Household Durables* (4.7%) accounted for proportionately more of total household expenditure. (See Chart 3, Table 1).

The more detailed expenditure data provided in Table 1 illustrate some of the further differences between urban and rural households. For example, average expenditure on wine in urban areas was over twice that in rural areas while the average expenditure on motor diesel in urban areas was less than a quarter of that in rural areas. Rural households spent twice as much as their urban counterparts on central heating oil. Urban households had greater access to piped gas and thus relied to a lesser extent on oil for central heating.

Many of the differences can be readily explained by the differing characteristics of households. Rural households (particularly farm households) are larger in size and have a greater reliance on private transport than their urban counterparts. A greater proportion of urban dwellings were rented (23.3%) in comparison to rural dwellings (6.5%). In addition, rents were higher, on average in urban areas. (See Table 1, Table 9).

Highest income households spend twice the state average

Households in the highest income decile (ie those with a gross weekly income in excess of €2,019.06) spent on average €1,656.82 per week, which was more than twice the overall average expenditure of €787.12 for all households. In contrast, households in the lowest income decile (ie with a gross income below €190.37) spent just €217.17, which was less than a third of the average for the State. (See Chart 4, Table 2).

Expenditure on *Food* and *Fuel and Light* accounted for almost 35% of total expenditure for households in the lowest income decile compared with just under 17% for the highest income households. On the other hand, expenditure on *Transport* and *Services and Other Expenditure* accounted for almost 52% of total expenditure in the highest income households while the corresponding figure was just 31% for those in the lowest income decile. (See Chart 4).

These differences in expenditure reflect corresponding variations in income levels. Household size and activity composition were also factors to some extent. The average household size in the highest income decile was 3.81 and just over 60% of the persons in these households were at work. In contrast, households in the lowest income decile had an average size of 1.12 and just over 82% of their members were retired or not at work. (See Table 2).

Highest expenditure in Dublin


Households in Dublin had the highest average weekly expenditure at €964.67 in 2004-2005. This was almost 41% higher than the €684.06 recorded five years earlier. The Border region, on the other hand, had the lowest expenditure at €617.87, which was 26% higher than the €490.24 recorded five years earlier. Expenditure for the Border region was 64% of that for Dublin. (See *Table B*).

Table B below compares total average weekly expenditure in each region to that for the State. Dublin and the Mid-East were the only regions for which average expenditure exceeded the State average of €787.12.

As a percentage of total expenditure, households in the West and Mid-West regions had the highest expenditure on *Food* at just over 20% while households in Dublin had the lowest at 16%. Households in Dublin had the highest expenditure on *Services & other Expenditure* (32.1%) and *Housing* (14.2%). (See *Table 3*).

A more detailed analysis reveals greater differences between the expenditures at regional level. For example, Dublin households spent the most on *Eating Out, Wine & Beer, Piped Gas, Rent & Mortgage Payments and Bus & Taxi Fares* while having the lowest expenditure on *Turf and Diesel*. Some of these differences reflect the variations in income and family size between regions but also highlight the variations in consumption patterns associated with lifestyle differences between urban and rural households. (See *Table 3*).

Mortgage holders are biggest spenders

Households in accommodation *Owned with a Mortgage* recorded the highest expenditure in 2004-2005 at €1,103.23. This was almost two and half times the €458.85 recorded in households in accommodation *Rented from Local Authorities*.

As a proportion of total expenditure, local authority households spent the most on *Food* (24.2%) and *Drink & Tobacco* (10.9%) and the least on *Transport* (11.3%) & *Services and other Expenditure* (19%). All other households spent proportionally more on *Housing, Transport and Services and other Expenditure*.

Households in accommodation *Rented from Local Authorities* recorded the highest increase in expenditure, at almost 50%, since 1999-2000. In addition, these households along with those in privately rented accommodation were the only households where *average weekly expenditure* exceeded *average weekly disposable income*, although the difference was more significant for local authority households. (See *Table C, Table 4*).

The more detailed data on Table 4 illustrates further differences in expenditure between the household categories. For example, households in accommodation *Owned with a Mortgage* spent over three times as much on *Eating Out* than households in accommodation *Rented from Local Authorities*. Also, households in accommodation *Owned Outright or with a Mortgage* spent more on *Cars, Private Health Insurance, Pensions, Life Assurance and Wine*. Households in accommodation rented from private owners recorded the highest expenditure on *Third level education fees*.

Employers and professionals highest spenders

Households where the reference person was an Employer or Professional (*Social Group 1*) recorded the highest *Average Weekly Expenditure*, at €1,053.68, while households where the reference person was involved in Agriculture & other Occupations (*Social Group 5*) had the lowest, at €487.40. (See *Table D, Table 5*).

As a proportion of total expenditure, households where the reference person was an Employer, Professional or Non Manual Worker (i.e. *Social Groups 1 & 2*) spent, on average, more on *Housing* (12.7%) and *Services and other Expenditure* (30.7%). Other *Social Groups* spent more on *Food* (20.1%), *Drink & Tobacco* (7.2%) and *Fuel & Light* (4.7%).

Households where the reference person was in *Social Group 1* also recorded the highest increase in expenditure, at 40% from the €752.81 recorded in 1999-2000 while households where the reference person was an employee engaged on non-manual work (*Social Group 2*) recorded the lowest, at 26.2%. (See *Table D, Table 5*).

The detailed data in *Table 5* illustrates some further differences in expenditure between the Social Groups. For example, households in *Social Group 1* spent over two and a half times as much on *Eating Out* and nine times as much on *Mortgage Payments* than households in *Social Group 5*.

Retired spend just over half of the state average

Households where the reference person was *Retired* had the lowest expenditure levels, at €453.09, which was just 57% of the average for the State (€787.12), while households where the reference person was an *Employee* had the highest expenditure at €1,017.88. (See *Table E, Table 6*).


As a proportion of total expenditure, households where the reference person was an *Employee* spent more on *Services and Other Expenditure* (30.9%) while all other households spent more on *Food, Drink & Tobacco and Fuel & Light*. (See *Table 6*).

Households where the reference person was either engaged in home duties or unable to work (i.e. *Other* category) recorded the highest increase in expenditure, at 55.4%, from the €343.84 recorded in 1999-2000, while households where the reference person was either *Self-employed* or *Out-of-work* recorded the lowest, at almost 34%. Expenditure on *Housing* almost doubled for all households except for those where the reference person was an *Employee* where it increased by just over 61%. (See *Table E*).

The variations in expenditure across the different categories can be accounted for by corresponding variations in income and to a certain extent activity composition. Over 84% of persons in households where

the reference person was *Retired* were inactive while almost 11% were at work. In contrast, just over 7% of persons in households where the reference was an *Employee* were inactive with just over 56% at work. (See Table 6).

Expenditure exceeds income for lone parent households

The average weekly expenditure for *Lone Parent* households exceeded that of average weekly disposable income by €54.25 or 12% in 2004-2005. Lone parent households spent on average, €505.21 per week, which was almost half the expenditure of households comprising of two adults up to three children (€1,047.08). (See Chart 6, Table 7).

As a proportion of total expenditure, *Lone Parent* households spent the most on *housing* (21.2%) and the least on *Transport* (11%) and *Services & Other Expenditure* (22.8%) while households with *Two Adults and up to Three Children* spent the most on *Services and Other Expenditure* (30%). Households with *Three or More Adults* recorded the highest expenditure on *Transport* (16.8%).

Lone parent households also recorded the highest increase in expenditure, at just over 52%, from the €331.72 recorded in 1999-2000. *Housing and Services & other Expenditure* accounted for over half of this increase (€173.49) rising by 80.8% and 68.4% respectively. Households consisting of *Three or More Adults* recorded the lowest increase in expenditure (38.9%). At an overall level, *Housing* costs increased by over 80% for all except households with *Two Adults and up to Three Children* where a more moderate increase (58.2%) was recorded. (See Table 7).

Spend on holidays up 46%

Households spent a total of €1,727.24 on holidays in 2004-2005, which was almost 46% higher than the €1,183.63 recorded five years earlier. (See Table 9).


Urban households spent €2,122.54 while their rural counterparts spent €1,085.05. Foreign holidays accounted for over 91% of total holiday expenditure in 2004-2005 compared to just over 88% in 1999-2000. (See Table 9).

On a regional basis, households in the Dublin and Mid East regions spent the most at €2,857.40 and €2308.30 respectively while the least was spent by Border and Mid-Western households at €998.12 and €851.88 respectively. (See Table 12).

Household Income

Average gross household income almost €1,000 per week



The average *Gross Weekly Household Income* for the State in 2004-2005 was €987.96, which was 48.2% higher than the €666.72 recorded five years earlier. Total *Direct Income*, rising by 47.3% from €585.41 to €862.55, accounted for most of this increase.

State Transfer Payments increased by 54.2% from €81.32 to €125.41 and accounted for 12.7% of *Gross Income*, which was just marginally higher than the 12.2% recorded five years earlier.

The *Total Direct Taxation* incurred by the average household increased by almost 26% over the period, reflecting the overall increase in *Direct Income*. However *Direct Taxation* in 2004-2005 accounted for just over 17% of *Direct Income* compared with almost 20% five years earlier.

Disposable Income, which is arrived at after the deduction of *Income Tax and Social Insurance*, increased by almost 53% from €551.60 to €842.98 and now represents just over 85% of *Gross Income* for all households in the State. (See Chart 7, Table F, Table 2).


Rural households record highest increase in income

Rural households recorded the highest increase in *Disposable Income* over the five-year period. The average weekly *Disposable Income* for rural households, at €796.77, increased by just over 62%. At an overall level, *Disposable Income* increased by just under 53% while urban households showed an increase of almost 49%.

In absolute terms, urban households recorded the highest *Disposable Income* at €871.43, which was slightly above the State average (€842.98) and just over 9% more than the €796.77 recorded for rural households. (See Table 1).

Non-farm income increases for farm households

The results from the 2004-2005 HBS indicate that for farm households, the proportion of *Direct Income* attributable to non-farm activities¹ increased over the five-year period. In 1999-2000, non-farm income accounted for 48% of *Direct Income* compared to over 53% in 2004-2005. As a result, the contribution of income from farming activity² to *Direct Income* has declined from 44% to just over 38% over the same five year period.

Gap between high-income and low-income households widens

The gap between the highest and lowest income households widened in the five-year period to 2004-2005.

Households in the lowest income decile (ie those with a gross weekly income below €190.37) recorded a weekly *Disposable Income* of €158.99 compared with €2,232.01 for those in the highest income decile (i.e. those with a gross weekly income in excess of €2,019.06). The ratio of the highest to the lowest household incomes was therefore approximately 14 to 1 compared with 13 to 1 in 1999-2000. (See Table G).



The average weekly *Disposable Income* of households in the top income decile increased by over 56% from the €1,428.71 recorded five years earlier. *Employee – Wages/Salaries* accounted for almost 44% of this increase resulting in *Total Direct Income* for households in the top income decile being over three times the State average. On the other hand *State Transfer Payments* accounted for over 94% of the increase in the average weekly *Disposable Income* for households in the lowest income decile. (See Table G, Table 2).

An examination of the demographic structure of households reveals that 21% of pensioners were in the lowest income decile compared to just 0.9% in the top decile. State Transfers in the form of *Old Age & Retirement and Widows' and Orphans' Pensions* were the main source of income for those in the lowest income decile. These benefits accounted for 59% of *Gross Income* for households in the lowest income decile and just 0.3% for those in the top income decile. (See Table 2).

Child Benefit almost one fifth of State Benefits

The average household *Child Benefit* payment was €23.96 per week and accounted for 19% of *Total State Benefits* in 2004-2005 compared with just 12.5% five years earlier.


Households in the higher income deciles received the largest payments reflecting, of course, the greater number of children in households in the higher income deciles. For example, households in the 8th income decile received €37.32 per week, which was over three times the amount received by households in the 3rd income decile.

The share of *Total State Benefits* accounted for by *Old Age Retirement and Widows & Orphans pensions* increased to a lesser extent than *Child Benefit* rising from 38.6% to 40.1% over the five-year period.

The contribution of *Unemployment Benefits* and *Assistance* payments to *Total State Benefits* declined from 12.2% in 1999-2000 to just 7% in 2004-2005 reflecting the decline in unemployment rates in the five year period since 1999-2000. (See Chart 9, Table 2).

Disposable income exceeds expenditure in 2004-2005


Chart 10: Disposable income and expenditure estimates for Household Budget Surveys, 1987-2005



In 2004-2005, the average household *Disposable Income* exceeded average expenditure. This reverses the trend of previous surveys where the average expenditure by households exceeded their disposable income. (See Chart 10).

However, when one compares disposable income and expenditure across the various income decile groups, a different picture emerges. The average weekly *Disposable Income* for households in the three highest income deciles (ie those with a gross weekly income in excess of €1,227.43) exceeded expenditure by between 11% and 35%. On the other hand, households in the remaining deciles recorded higher expenditure than disposable income. In particular, households in the two lowest income deciles (ie with a gross income less than €312.23) recorded differentials of between 24% and 37%. (See Table 2).

Lone parent households earn half the State average

In 2004-2005, the *average weekly gross income* for lone parent households was €482.90, which was just under half the State average of €987.96. *State Transfers* accounted for just under half of the Gross weekly Income of these households reflecting the greater reliance on payments from the State. In these households 17% of the persons were working compared to, for example, over 50% for households where there were *Three or More Adults*.

On the other hand, households with *Three or More Adults* had the highest gross income at €1418.84 followed closely at €1,314.07 by households with *Two Adults and up to Three Children*. These were the only households where gross income exceeded the average for the State. On average, at least one third of the persons in these households were at work while just under one fifth were unemployed. (See *Chart 11, Table 7*).

Mortgage holders are highest earners

In terms of household tenure, households in accommodation *Owned with a Mortgage* reported the highest gross weekly income at €1,413.51, which was almost 60% more than that the €884.94 recorded in 1999-2000. Direct Income, in the form of *Wages & Salaries* was the dominant source of income (95%) for these households and the 61.1% increase in it accounted for virtually all of the overall increase in gross income. (See *Table H*).


In contrast, households in accommodation *Rented from Local Authorities* had the lowest gross weekly income at €453.47, which was less than a third of that for households in accommodation *Owned with a Mortgage* (€1413.51). *State Transfers* and *Direct Income* accounted for almost equal shares of gross weekly income for these households.

These differences reflect the varying activity composition of households across the tenure categories. Almost half of the persons living in accommodation *Owned with a Mortgage* were *At Work* with just over one tenth either *Inactive* or *Unemployed*. On the other hand, just over one fifth of persons living in accommodation *Rented from Local Authorities* were *At Work* with just over two fifths either *Inactive* or *Unemployed*.

The average gross weekly incomes for the remaining households, despite recording increases of between 28% and 42%, were all below the State average. (See *Table H, Table 4*).

Mid-Eastern households make greatest income gains



The *average gross weekly income* for households in the Mid-Eastern region, at €1140.25, increased by just over 78% from the €639.93 recorded in 1999-2000 compared to just over 48% for the State as a whole. Much of this increase was accounted for by increases in *Employees – Wages & Salaries*, which almost doubled for these households over the five-year period.

In absolute terms, *Dublin* households recorded the highest average weekly gross income at €1,284.50, while the lowest was recorded for households in the *Border Region* at €755.56. Gross income for households in the other regions, apart from those in the *Mid-East*, while increasing at rates between 40% and 56% were less than the *State* average.

The variations in gross incomes across regions can be explained to some extent by reference to the activity composition of household members. A higher proportion of persons living in *Dublin* and *Mid Eastern* households were working (46.2%) and less were *Inactive* or *Unemployed* (22.8%) compared to their counterparts in the other regions. (See Chart 12, Table 3).

Comparing HBS and EU-SILC income data

The EU Survey on Income and Living Conditions (EU-SILC) was introduced in Ireland in June 2003. First results relating to data collected in the six-month period between June and December 2003 were published in January 2005. The survey is an annual survey conducted by the Central Statistics Office (CSO) to obtain information on the income and living conditions of different types of households. The survey also collects information on poverty and social exclusion. Data for the reference years 2004, 2005 and 2006 have also been published.

The HBS also provides information on income but it is used primarily for categorical purposes (eg analysing households according to different levels of disposable income) rather than the provision of information on income levels. Table I below summarises some of the key income distribution and poverty indicators for both surveys.

When interpreting these figures it is important to take note of a number of important methodological differences:

- The EU-SILC collects income data based on the 12-month period prior to the survey (ie floating reference period) and makes adjustments for the employment activity of the individual over that 12-month period. The HBS on the other hand calculates income on the basis of the "current income level" of the individual without adjustment for employment activity over the year in question. As a result weekly income levels from the HBS will tend to be higher than those recorded in the EU-SILC.
- The data collection period for the 2004-2005 HBS ran from October 2004 to December 2005 thus centring the income data around June/July of 2005. The data collection period for the 2005 EU-SILC on the other hand was based on the calendar year. Given the floating income reference period for EU-SILC, income data actually relates to a 24-month period, in effect centring the SILC income data around January of the reference year ie six months earlier than that for the HBS.

- Data on social transfers in EU-SILC are derived primarily from administrative data sources (ie directly from data holdings within the Department of Social and Family Affairs). In the HBS the information is provided directly by the respondent and as a result is subject to the normal measurement concerns such as recall or the provision of incomplete information.

In conclusion, income data from the two sources are not directly comparable. However, in this case, while the main components differ, the overall Gross Incomes and Gini Co-efficients (a measure of inequalities) are much the same. **The EU-SILC is recognised as the primary source of data on income in Ireland.**

Household Appliances and Facilities

42% of households have Internet access

In 2004-2005, just over 42% of households indicated having access to the Internet compared with just over 14% five years earlier.

Of these households, 75% had access by phone link, 18% by broadband and the remaining 7% by ISDN. Dublin and Mid-East regions had the highest proportion of households with internet access by broadband at 17% and 9.9% respectively while the corresponding figure, on average, was just under 3% for all other households. (See *Table 9, Table 12*).

Just over 56% of households had a home computer in 2004-2005 compared with a figure of just over 29% recorded in 1999-2000. (See *Table 9*).

Mobile Phone ownership continues to rise

The results show that over 84% of households now have at least one mobile phone compared to just over 44% five years earlier.

Over 91% of households in the highest income quintile (ie with a gross weekly income in excess of €1,524.57) reported having at least one mobile phone, which was over twice as many as households in the lowest income quintile (ie with a gross weekly income less than €312.23).

The proportion of households with a fixed telephone line showed a slight decline from just over 89% to just under 86% in the five-year period from 1999-2000.

Other notable increases in the availability of appliances over the five years were: Tumble Dryers (42% to 61.7%), Microwave Ovens (71.5% to 86%), Dishwashers, (32% to 50.1%) and Burglar Alarms, (23.9% to 32.6%). (See *Table K, table L ,Table 11*).

Weekly SSIA contributions averaged €27 per household

The average SSIA contribution for all households in the State was €27 per week in 2004-05. Just under 42% of households reported as having at least one SSIA account and the number of accounts held and the average weekly contribution varied considerably with overall household gross income. (See *Table J*).

Over 72% of all households in the highest income quintile had at least one SSIA account and paid an average weekly contribution of almost €65. For households who reported an SSIA, just under 10% of these households, in the lowest income quintile, had at least one SSIA account and paid just over €40 per week in contributions.

Over one third of households with at least one SSIA account were in the highest income quintile while just under 5% were in the lowest income quintile.

APPENDIX 2

CONCEPTS and DEFINITIONS

Household

A household is defined as a single person or group of people who regularly reside together in the same accommodation and who share the same catering arrangements. The household members defined in this fashion are not necessarily related by blood or by marriage. Thus, resident domestic workers and boarders (ie persons paying to share the household accommodation and meals), are included. Any other individual or group of people living in the same dwelling constitute a separate household or households if they have separate catering arrangements.

The following criteria are applied in the survey to certain categories of persons to decide whether or not they are members of a particular household:—

- (I) Family members who permanently live and work away from home are not included in their home household even though they return on holidays, (if they are visiting the home household during the survey period they are treated as visitors and excluded)
- (ii) Children away at primary and secondary boarding school are included as members of their parents' households, but older persons receiving higher education away from home, (eg at University, Teacher or Garda Training College etc), are included as members only if they are at home for the full fourteen day period of diary record-keeping (eg during vacations)
- (iii) Family members working away from home who contribute to the income of their home household are included as members of the household only if they return home at least one night each week
- (iv) Family members who do not contribute to the income of their home household and who are regularly away from home for part of each week are included as members of the household only if they spend at least four nights at home each week
- (v) Boarders are included in the household only if they reside there for at least four nights a week and have at least one meal each day with the family when they are in residence
- (vi) Family members temporarily away on holiday, on business or in hospital are included as members of the household unless they have been away continuously for more than six months prior to the Interviewer's visit
- (vii) Visitors and temporary members of the household are included as household members only if they have resided continuously in the household for more than six months prior to the interview.

No specific direction is given as to who is to be taken as the reference person of the household (ie equivalent to the head of household concept in earlier surveys). The Social Group of the reference person is used to classify the sample household for the presentation of results and for the third stage reweighting classifications used in the derivation of results. The weights used are determined by collating the number of co-operating sample households, (after the first and second stage proportional reweighting adjustments), with the number of households from the 2002 Census of Population, in detailed sub-classifications, defined in terms of the social group of the reference person (or head of household) and other household characteristics.

For this reason it is essential that the concept of reference person used in both the Census of Population and the survey should be comparable. No explicit instruction is given in the Census of

Population as to who is to be taken as the reference person. It is left to individual households to determine who is the appropriate person. There is no problem in normal family-type situations.

In other cases (eg man, wife and a married child with family) decisions made depend on the circumstances and the approach followed in both the survey and the Census of Population is to take the person whom the household regards as its reference person. In cases where the household consists of unmarried or unrelated people where expenses are jointly paid, (eg flat or apartment), the eldest member is taken as the reference person in the Household Budget Survey in the absence of any other influencing factors. In the 2004-2005 survey, the principal economic supporter and the person in whose name the accommodation was owned or rented are also identified and classifications by social group and other characteristics are available on these alternative bases.

Children are defined as household members *under fourteen years of age* for the purpose of classifying clothing expenditure between adults (men and women) and children (boys and girls). Clothing purchased for infants *under two years of age* is classified as babywear. The principal household composition classification used for the presentation of results is also based on children aged *under fourteen years of age*. Classifications are also available based on children aged under fifteen, sixteen and seventeen years of age.

Household Expenditure

The household expenditure concept used in the 2004-2005 survey was equivalent to that used in earlier inquiries. It is defined as:

- (I) All expenditure incurred by household members with the exceptions of:
 - (a) repayments of personal loans and debts other than house purchase mortgage repayments
 - (b) regular and ad hoc savings including SSAs (other than life assurance), and purchases of stocks, shares, other investments and property
 - (c) direct personal taxation (ie income tax and social insurance contributions)
 - (d) business expenses
- (ii) Retail value of home-grown produce (ie from own garden or farm) consumed by the household
- (iii) The value of any free goods and services regularly received by household members (i.e. free meals, food, fuel or subsidised housing received from employers), payments by employers of health insurance and life insurance premiums and school fees and leisure club fees for their employees; free school milk and meals given to children and household expenses (eg rent, electricity etc.) regularly paid by non-residents (e.g. relatives, friends, charitable organisations etc.). The estimated benefit-in-kind to employees from the use of company cars is also included in expenditure on new cars. The individual values entered for most of these imputed expenditures are shown in the detailed tables in Section B.

Income tax payments and social insurance contributions are not included in household expenditure as they are treated as charges on household income. The values accruing under the household expenditure components (ii) and (iii) above are also included on the income side. With the exception of free school meals and milk, which have been traditionally included in household expenditure, state benefits in kind are not included in either expenditure or income.

In Irish surveys of this type expenditure is traditionally recorded in the diaries on a payment basis - i.e. respondents record individual payments (whether by cash or cheque) personally made each day even if the goods were delivered previously or are going to be delivered later. Experience has

shown that this payment approach is more suited to Irish conditions than the alternative acquisition or consumption methods. The major advantage of the payment approach is that it is a relatively simple procedure for respondents to understand and follow and, as expenditure is recorded almost concurrently with the actual payments, there is less likelihood of errors being made.

Under these payments based diary completion procedures, any goods ordered or delivered but not paid for are ignored unless they are acquired through one of the following credit arrangements:

(1) Credit accounts

Respondents are required to record in their diaries the description and cost of the individual items acquired through credit accounts with grocers, butchers, milkmen etc. The value of items acquired through these credit accounts are entered as household expenditure. Any payments made in respect of these accounts recorded in the diaries are ignored during processing to avoid duplication. This procedure avoids difficulties which would otherwise arise with the itemisation of credit account payments (eg monthly grocery bill) in the detail necessary for expenditure coding purposes.

(2) Hire purchases (ie instalment credit)

Hire purchase payments always relate to specific items and expenditure on transactions of this kind are summarised in the survey by combining the instalment payments being made on the occasion of the interview with the cash down-payments made on any articles acquired in this fashion during the three months prior to the interview and the fourteen day period of record-keeping. The weekly equivalent values of these expenditures are included in the average weekly expenditure derived for individual commodity headings. For information, the instalment payments being made at the time of the interview are also shown separately under four broad headings (codes 1-4) in the detailed tables (9-12) in Section B.

(3) Budget or credit clubs

These are credit purchase arrangements whereby articles are purchased against regular advance payments. These instalment payments, therefore, do not normally relate to a specified item when they are being made and they are summarised separately in the detailed tables (9-12) in Section B. Respondents are, however, also required to list the individual goods acquired through these budget or credit clubs during the fourteen days of record keeping, and they are also asked to list any other acquisitions made during the four preceding weeks at the interview stage. The weekly equivalent value of these expenditures is included under the individual commodity headings.

Details of regular household payments (eg rent, mortgage repayments, house insurance premiums, electricity, telephone etc) and personal payments (eg licences, life assurance, education fees etc) are in the Household (HB.1) and Personal (HB.2) Questionnaires. Retrospective questions generally relating to the twelve months preceding the interview are also traditionally used in the survey for a limited number of major and easily remembered irregular outlays, such as purchases of central heating oil and motor cars, domestic appliances, audio-acoustic goods, work of outside contractors and bulk purchases of solid fuel, in-patient hospital expenses, private health insurance refunds and holiday expenses. During processing, diary entries relating to items covered in the questionnaires are deleted. Computerised validation checks based on corresponding expenditure code ranges ensure that there is no duplicating questionnaire and diary entries.

The following points relating to the collection of household expenditure data require special emphasis:

(a) Part exchange and second-hand purchases

All payments made in respect of part exchange and second-hand purchases during the fourteen day period of record-keeping are recorded. Only net payments are summarised and any amount allowed for goods traded in or exchanged in part exchange are deducted.

(b) Business expenses

All business expenses are excluded since the survey is concerned only with the expenditure incurred by household members in their private capacity. Joint private/business expenses (eg electricity, telephone etc.), covering both the household dwelling and a business conducted at the same location, are specially identified and the business element is estimated with the assistance of the respondent.

(c) Own garden/farm produce consumed in the home

The quantity and retail value of all home-grown produce consumed (ie from the household's own farm or garden) is recorded on a daily basis. The weekly equivalent retail value of the produce consumed is summarised under the corresponding expenditure headings, and the combined aggregate value is included in direct household income. The principal products involved are summarised under items 9-15 in the detailed tables (9-12) in Section B.

(d) Supply of articles from family shop

The retail value of articles obtained without payment from a family shop are recorded in the expenditure diaries as they are acquired.

(e) Medical expenses

Details of in-patient hospital expenses and private health insurance refunds during the twelve months preceding the interview are determined using a retrospective question on the HB.2 Personal Questionnaire. Out-patient expenses (eg X rays, medical tests, out-patient hospital charges), are based on the entries recorded in the fourteen day diary records. To avoid duplication, medical insurance refunds are shown as a deduction from expenditure, as the premiums paid are included in expenditure.

(f) Expenditure abroad

Total expenditure on holidays of at least four nights abroad is based on replies to a special retrospective question relating to holidays during the twelve months preceding the interview; expenditure on shorter foreign holidays and visits and personal expenditure on business trips abroad continues to be made on the basis of the diary records. In the case of foreign holidays of four nights or more, the expenditure estimates cover all costs incurred (ie cost of packaged holiday, transport, hotels, meals, entertainment, personal expenditure etc.).

Household Income

The household income concept used in the survey is equivalent to that used in earlier inquiries. It is defined to include all money receipts which accrue to the household together with the value of any free goods and services regularly received by household members and the retail value of own farm or garden produce consumed by the household. The gross receipts (ie before deduction of income tax and social insurance contributions) of individual household members are converted to weekly equivalent amounts and combined to give the average gross weekly income for the household.

The following sources of household income are distinguished in the detailed table of this report:

(I) Wages and salaries of employees

Each employee is asked to provide particulars of the wage or salary actually received the last time payment was made. The actual gross amount last received is always used irrespective of whether it happened to be temporarily increased by overtime, bonuses etc or reduced because of illness, short-time etc. The gross figure summarised includes income tax, social insurance and all other deductions made at source by the employer. Additions are made to this gross figure to include the weekly equivalent value of any regular bonuses, commissions etc received during twelve months preceding the interview. This heading also includes the gross earnings of any household member accruing from regular subsidiary employment as an employee. Account is also taken of any free meals, food and fuel received from employers and earnings from occasional work; these amount are summarised under other direct income.

Persons involved in State training, work experience or Community Employment Schemes are generally classified as employees and the payment they receive is coded as a wage since the bulk of these schemes involve working on some project. Only where the training element predominates are persons classified as unemployed or as a student, depending on their own perception of their situation.

Where employees are away from work without pay on the occasion of the interview, the normal wage or salary is ignored and State, trade union or other benefits being received as an alternative are used in the compilation of household income.

(ii) Income from self-employment (non-farming)

Household members working on their own account or in partnership in a business other than farming are asked to state their gross income net of depreciation allowances and business expenses. A zero income is taken when a loss is incurred. This heading also includes the income of any household member accruing from regular subsidiary own account employment; income from any such occasional work is summarised under other direct income.

(iii) Income from self-employment (farming)

Income from farming is defined as the total sales of farm produce and other receipts from farming activity (eg sales of turf and timber, services fees, premiums, prizes, subsidies etc.) less purchase of livestock and current farm operating expenses (eg labour, fuel and other farm supplies, depreciation, hire and repair of machinery, rates, annuities and rent on land, farm share of car, electricity and telephone expenses, interest payments etc.) after account is taken of stock changes. This definition is identical to the concept of family farm income used in Farm Accounts Surveys except for the treatment of the home consumption of own farm produce. The latter is separately classified in the Household Budget Survey and valued at retail prices.

Households co-operating in the National Farm Survey conducted by Teagasc were integrated into the Household Budget Survey and farming income details were transferred from the farm accounts maintained in the Teagasc survey (see Appendix 3). In the case of the remainder of the sample some cases were encountered where farming was the subsidiary occupation of a household member as it was not possible to identify these for exclusion at the sample selection stage. In these cases a special summary farm income questionnaire (similar to that used for small scale farming households in earlier surveys) was completed and farming income was estimated by the Central Statistics Office for these cases on this basis.

(iv) Retirement pensions

The gross amounts (ie before any deductions) being received by household members as pensions in respect of previous employment are summarised under this heading. Old age and all other social welfare pensions are treated as State transfer payments.

(v) Investment income (Foreign and Domestic)

Investment income is estimated on the basis of the gross interest and dividends (ie before deduction of income tax) received or credited to household members during the twelve months preceding the interview from stocks, shares and other investments. Net receipts after deduction of income tax at source are grossed during processing on the basis of the standard rate of income tax.

(vi) Property income

Property income includes the gross rent received by households in respect of subletting part of their accommodation together with the rent or income accruing from other property after the deduction of expenses allowed for income tax purposes. Rent received by farmers from land let is also summarised under this heading.

No allowance is made in the compilation of either household income or expenditure for the imputed rent which owner occupiers could be considered to forego by not letting their dwellings. Allowance is however made for the imputed rent which rent-free tenants enjoy as a result of paying no rent.

(vii) Own garden/farm produce

The average weekly equivalent value at local retail prices of any own farm or garden produce consumed by sample household during the fourteen days of record-keeping is included in household income under this heading and also summarised as household expenditure under the relevant commodities.

(viii) Other direct income

This heading covers other miscellaneous income sources such as annuities, trusts and covenants, trade union sick or strike pay, the value of free goods and services regularly received by household members (eg free meals, food, fuel, subsidised housing, paid utility bills etc) received from employers or from persons outside the household. Payments by employers of health insurance and life insurance premiums and school fees and leisure club fees for other employees are included as well as the benefit in kind to employees from the use of company cars.

(ix) State transfer payments

This heading covers actual cash amounts being received on the occasion of the interview in the form of State benefits, assistance and allowances. They are classified as follows in the detailed tables of this report:

- (1) child benefit
- (2) old age and retirement pensions
- (3) widows' and orphans' pensions
- (4) other long term social welfare
- (5) unemployment benefit and assistance

- (6) back to work allowance
- (7) back to education allowance
- (8) Farm Assist
- (9) Carer's Allowance
- (10) Carer's Benefit
- (11) Education grants/scholarships
- (12) other State transfers

With the exception of free school meals (valued at cost), the value of State benefits in kind (eg free health services, home assistance etc) are not included in either household income or expenditure. Farmers in receipt of unemployment assistance are not treated as out of work, they are always classified as being self-employed.

Gross household income is defined as direct income plus State transfer payments and is used extensively to classify the results in this report. Disposable household income is defined as gross income less direct taxation. Separate estimates are provided for both these concepts in the detailed tables (1-8) in Section B of this report.

Gross household income excludes certain receipts which are generally of an irregular and non-recurring nature. The principal exclusions are receipts for sale of possessions, withdrawals from savings, loans obtained, loan repayments received, windfalls, prizes, maturing insurance policies etc. Furthermore, transfers of money between household members (eg pocket money, housekeeping money etc.) are ignored since the household is treated as a single unit. The sole exception to this rule is the wage given to a resident domestic worker. This wage is included in household income, but is balanced by the inclusion of the same amount as household expenditure under the heading domestic service. When a household includes a boarder the payment made for board and lodgings constitutes an internal transfer and is therefore ignored. Since boarders are treated as household members their personal expenditure and income are, however, included in the details for the household as a whole.

Social Group

Sample households have been classified in this report to the social group of the reference person of the household. Five Social Groups are distinguished. These are defined in terms of the following combinations of the eleven Socio-Economic Groups used in the 1996 Census of Population:

Social Group	Socio-Economic Groups (1996 Census of Population)
1	Higher professional Lower professional Employers and managers
2	Own account workers Non-manual workers
3	Manual skilled workers
4	Semi-skilled manual workers Unskilled manual workers

5	Farmers, agricultural workers. All other gainfully occupied and unknown
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The 2002 Census socio-economic group classification procedures were followed exactly, namely:

- (I) If the reference person is gainfully occupied the social group is determined by his/her occupation
- (ii) If the relevant person is unemployed the social group is determined by his/her usual occupation
- (iii) If the reference person is retired the Social Group is determined by his/her former occupation
- (iv) In other cases the Social Group is based on the occupation of the person within the household on whom the reference person is deemed to be dependent; otherwise the reference person is assigned to the residual Social Group 5.

Urban and rural households

Urban households are defined as being located in cities and towns of all sizes distinguished for Census of Population purposes including suburban areas. The boundaries of towns and their classification by population size were based on the 2002 Census of Population.

Rural households are located outside the boundaries of cities and towns (including suburban areas).

Farm households in the presentation of results in this report are defined as households where

- (1) the head of household is a gainfully occupied farmer, or
- (2) the head of household is a retired farmer with at least one gainfully occupied farmer in the household.

This definition does not include other households involved in farming - ie cases where there is a gainfully occupied farmer (and where the head is not a farmer or retired farmer) or where farming is the subsidiary occupation of the head or any other household member. It is equivalent, but not exactly identical to the definition of farm households in former surveys. A slightly different definition was used for reweighting purposes in order to collate corresponding categories of households in the Household Budget Survey sample and 2002 Census of Population (see Appendix 4). Classifications of farm households defined in various other ways are also available.

Life Cycle of Head of Household

The following eleven life cycles based on the age of the eldest child are distinguished in the accompanying tables. An alternative classification based on age of youngest child is also available.

Health conditions and resulting difficulties with certain activities

Health conditions refer to anything that has affected the respondent in the 6 months prior to interview, or is likely to affect the respondent for at least 6 months thereafter.

Categories of health conditions

- 1 Blindness, deafness or a severe vision or hearing impairment

- 2 A condition that substantially limits one or more basic physical activities such as walking, climbing stairs, reaching, lifting or carrying
- 3 A learning or intellectual disability
- 4 A psychological or emotional condition
- 5 Other, including any chronic illness

If the respondent answered Yes to having any one of the above health conditions, they were then asked if any difficulties were experienced in carrying out any of the following activities.

Categories of activities

- 1 Learning, remembering or concentrating
- 2 Dressing, bathing or getting around inside the house
- 3 Going outside the home alone to visit the shop or visit a doctor's surgery
- 4 Working at a job or business or attending school or college
- 5 Participating in other activities, for example, leisure or using transport

Definitions

Equivalence scales

Equivalence scales are used to calculate the *equivalised household size* in a household. Although there are numerous scales, the national scale is used in this instance. The national scale attributes a weight of 1 to the first adult, 0.66 to each subsequent adult (ages 14+ living in the household) and 0.33 to each child aged less than 14. The weights for each household member are then summed to calculate the *equivalised household size*.

Example:

A household consists of 5 people: 2 adults and 3 children. The national scale gives a weight of 1 to the first adult and 0.66 to each subsequent adult (aged 14+) living in the household, and 0.33 to each child. Thus this household's *equivalised household size* is $1 + 0.66 + 0.33 + 0.33 + 0.33 = 2.65$.

Equivalised disposable income

The disposable household income is divided by the *equivalised household size* to calculate the equivalised disposable income for each individual, which essentially is an approximate measure of how much of the income can be attributed to each member of the household. This *equivalised income* is then applied to each member of the household.

Example:

If a household has a total disposable income of €50,000 and the equivalised household size is 2.65, the equivalised disposable income for this household is €18,679.92. This income is applied to each member of the household.

At risk of poverty rate

This is the share of persons with an equivalised disposable income (including state transfers) below a given percentage (usually 60%) of the national median disposable income (including state transfers). The rate is calculated by ranking persons by equivalised disposable income from smallest

to largest and the median or middle value is extracted. Anyone with an equivalised disposable income of less than 60% of the median is considered at risk of poverty at a 60% level.

Income distribution (income quintile share ratio)

This is the ratio of total equivalised disposable income received by the 20% of persons with the highest disposable income (top quintile) to that received by the 20% of persons with the lowest disposable income (lowest quintile). This is also called the S80/S20 quintile share ratio.

Gini co-efficient

This is the relationship between cumulative shares of the population arranged according to the level of disposable income and the cumulative share of total disposable income received by them. For example, 20% of the population should ideally have 20% of the total income. If there was perfect equality (ie each person receives the same disposable income), the Gini co-efficient would be 0%. A Gini co-efficient of 100% would indicate that there was total inequality and the entire national income was in the hands of one person.

No allowance is made in this classification for the existence of persons in the household other than the resident spouse and/or children of the head of household. The presence of other relatives of the head (eg parents, sons/daughters-in-law, nephews/nieces etc) or of other persons (eg visitors, boarders etc) does not influence classification.

APPENDIX 3

METHODOLOGY

Data Collection/Forms Used in the Survey

Information was collected by means of Household (HB1) and Personal (HB2) Interview Questionnaires and Expenditure Diaries (the large version HB3 was provided to the houseperson and the smaller sized version HB4 was offered to other household members). Copies of these forms are reproduced in Appendix 5. These are similar in design to those used in previous surveys.

Survey Coverage

The survey extends to all private households in the country. All other residential establishments (eg hotels, hospitals, convents, hostels, prisons etc) in which people reside collectively are excluded in the selection of the sample. Separate private accommodation attached to these institutions in which families independently reside are covered by the survey as are private households living at an address which also includes a family business. Boarding houses, defined as establishments containing three or more boarders, are also excluded from the survey. These can only be identified during fieldwork and eliminated at that stage, as were other excluded establishments not identified in the selection of the sample.

A household is defined as a single person or group of people who regularly reside together in the same accommodation and who share the same catering arrangements. The household members are not necessarily related by blood or by marriage.

The reference person in a household is the person who was entered on the first line of the household membership listing of Question 1 of the Household Questionnaire (HB1) (i.e. equivalent to the "head of household" concept in earlier surveys). This was traditionally the person in whose name the accommodation was owned or rented and/or who was mainly responsible for meeting household expenses. The choice was left to the household.

Data Provided by Households

Each sample household is required to:

- (a) *provide particulars of household membership, accommodation, facilities, amenities and regular household expenses (eg rent, electricity, telephone etc)*
- (b) *have all constituent household members aged fifteen years and over provide details of their income and regular personal expenditure, and also maintain detailed diary records of their day to day personal expenditure for fourteen consecutive days.*

Households were accepted as co-operating only if all the required data was provided and each household member aged fifteen years and over kept an expenditure diary. The refusal of one member to co-operate resulted in the whole household being eliminated. These strict participation criteria contributed to the relatively high non-response rates which are traditionally experienced in the Household Budget Survey.

The sub-sample of farm households replicated from the National Farm Survey also participated in the maintenance of detailed Farm Accounts for the calendar year 2004 with Teagasc. A special farm income questionnaire was also completed by Household Interviewers for any persons in the main Household Budget sample who were also involved in farming.

Sample Design and Selection

As in previous Household Budget Surveys, the sample was stratified for operational and economy reasons.

A two-stage sample design was used. This comprised of a first stage sample of 2,600 blocks (or survey areas) randomly selected at county level to proportionately represent the following eight strata relating to population density:

- 1 County Borough
- 2 Suburbs of County Boroughs
- 3 Environs of County Boroughs
- 4 Towns 10,000 +
- 5 Towns 5,001 - 10,000
- 6 Towns 1,000 - 5,000
- 7 Mixed Urban/Rural Areas
- 8 Rural Areas

Each block was selected to contain, on average, 75 households. In the rural areas, each block was further divided into 4 sub-blocks, each containing approximately 18 households. The rural survey areas were randomly selected from within these sub-blocks.

The second sampling stage involved the random selection of two independent samples of 4 original households and 4 substitute households for each survey area. The number of original sample households constituted the quota of co-operating households to be realised in each survey area and the interviewer systematically approached as many substitute households as was necessary to realise this quota. In this fashion, variations in response by region and town size were controlled.

The actual number of households for which satisfactorily completed returns were obtained in particular areas was sometimes less than the required quota. This was either because the number of substitute households was not sufficient when the response was low or some of those who initially promised to co-operate dropped out of the survey during the 14 day diary record-keeping and substitutes could not be introduced before the interviewer left the area.

Similar to previous Household Budget Surveys, the integration of the National Farm Survey (NFS) sample of farm households was accommodated by identifying and eliminating any farm households in the original and substitute samples of households in each survey area. As the NFS households were distributed throughout the country (the sample was not clustered geographically), they were linked to the survey area (urban or rural) that they were located in or to which they were most adjacent. Interviewers endeavoured to secure the co-operation of all National Farm Survey Households. No substitutes were available in these cases.

Integration of National Farm Survey Sample Households

A total of 827 farm households which co-operated in the 2004 National Farm Survey were supplied by Teagasc for possible inclusion in the Household Budget Survey sample.

After excluding some cases (ie remoteness, non-adjacency to Household Budget Survey sample areas etc), a total of 794 farm households from the 1999 National Farm Survey were added to the 2004-2005 Household Budget Survey sample. These sample households were surveyed by Household Budget Interviewers at predetermined stages throughout 2004-2005.

Urban and rural households

Urban households are defined as being located in cities and towns, including their suburbs, distinguished for Census of Population purposes. The boundaries of towns (with a population of

1,000 or more) and their classification by population size were based on the 1996 Census of Population.

Rural households are located outside the boundaries of cities and towns (including suburban areas).

Rural farm households are defined as households where the principal occupation of the reference person of the household is farming or, where the reference person is a retired farmer, and there is at least one other household member whose main occupation is farming.

Fieldwork

Fieldwork was undertaken by a team of fifty temporary part-time Household Interviewers and five temporary full-time Field Co-ordinators specially recruited for the survey. Training of field staff commenced in September 2004 with the fieldwork starting in mid October 2004. It was fully completed by mid December 2005.

Survey areas were grouped into fifty regional interviewer assignments. Household Interviewers, in as much as was possible, resided within, or adjacent to, the regions they were responsible for. The constituent survey areas in each Interviewer assignment were completed in a specific order predetermined to ensure that the national sample of urban areas, towns of different sizes and rural areas were approximately distributed regionally throughout the survey period.

As the National Farm Survey sample households were distributed throughout the country, (the sample was not clustered geographically), they were linked to the survey area (urban or rural) they were located in or to which they were most adjacent. They were surveyed by the Household Interviewer at the same time as the sample households in related areas. National Farm Survey field staff played a significant role in the integration of these households into the Household Budget Survey. They explained the purpose of the joint operation to the households and encouraged them to co-operate prior to the Household Budget Survey Interviewers' visit. They also personally liaised with the Interviewers immediately before they called.

In the urban areas, Household Interviewers were provided with address listings of original and substitute sample households for each survey area - four of each less the farm households (ie those with one or more member with farming as a principal occupation) identified at the sample selection stage. For rural areas, they were provided with the name of a townland from which they systematically picked their quota of co-operating households. The same procedure was adopted for Teagasc Households as with urban areas. The address listings also included any related National Farm Survey households. In each survey area Interviewers worked systematically through the listing of original sample households and approached substitute sample households until the required quota of co-operating households were realised. Any National Farm Survey household linked to the area were also surveyed.

The survey was concerned with the households resident at the selected addresses on the occasion of the Interviewer's initial visit. Interviewers were not permitted to introduce non-selected addresses or townland areas into the sample. They were required to secure the co-operation at a regular rate of about four households each week. Interviewers generally had to make two to four separate visits to secure the co-operation of individual household members and to complete the household and personal questionnaires. The expenditure diaries were completed by each household member aged fifteen years and over and Interviewers made up to four inspection visits during the fourteen day period to ensure that entries were being recorded correctly.

In the case of farm households every effort was made to ensure that the sizeable consumption of own-farm produce was correctly recorded. Household Interviewers advised on the quantification procedure which appeared best suited to individual circumstances. The household and farming elements (eg electricity, telephone, motor tax and insurance etc) of joint expenses were also estimated. These breakdowns were subsequently checked for consistency with the

corresponding estimates made in the National Farm Survey; the latter were taken in the case of any conflicts.

Inducement to Co-operate

A large scale national publicity campaign was undertaken at the beginning and middle of the fieldwork. Field staff also used local sources of advertising as much as possible to announce commencement of fieldwork in an area. An introductory letter was also sent to all sample households prior to the Interviewer's visit explaining the nature and purpose of the survey.

Although the co-operation of sample households was mainly canvassed by Interviewers on the basis of the importance of the survey and the usefulness of the results (eg for Consumer Price Index reweighting), response also benefited from a monetary inducement offered to each person aged fifteen years and over in co-operating households in appreciation of their participation. If each person aged fifteen years and over in a sample household satisfactorily co-operated in the survey, they were each given a €30 gratuity payment.

Survey Response

A total of 16,635 sample addresses were visited by Interviewers during the course of the survey; 1,966 of these related to vacant or demolished dwelling, boarding houses, institutions and other addresses excluded from the scope of the survey. This left an effective sample of 14,651 households (including those not contacted) of which 7,411 initially agreed to participate and 6,884 persevered to the end of the fourteen day period of record keeping.

The effective response rates for town and country survey areas in the 1999-2000 and 2004-2005 Household Budget Surveys are compared in the following table. The Teagasc National Farm Survey sample households must be excluded from this comparison because of their exceptionally higher response rates. This stemmed from the fact that they were already established respondents in the maintenance of farm accounts in the National Farm Survey which would bias the overall response upwards.

¹The effective sample is defined as the number of sample addresses visited less vacant or demolished dwellings, boarding houses, institutions and other addresses excluded from the scope of the survey; households which were not contacted despite repeated visits are included in the effective sample.

Weighting of Results

A three stage weighting arrangement was used in the 2004-2005 survey to correct for any biases in the final sample of co-operating households due to the sample design and differential response. The 1st and 2nd weighting stages arise as a result of the integration of the independently selected National Farm Survey sample households. The 3rd stage weighting is similar to that traditionally used in former Household Budget Surveys.

(1) Representative of Farming Households by Farm Size and System (1st stage weighting)

The first weighting arrangement is a replication of the system used in the Teagasc National Farm Survey to ensure the correct representation of farming households in different farm systems and size categories (using Eurostat farm typology classification methodology). The following different types of farming households are represented in the National Farm Survey:

(a) Farming is the principal activity

- (i) Farming is the principal occupation of the reference person
- (ii) Reference person **is not** in the labour force (ie retired, engaged in home duties, incapacitated etc) and farming is the principal occupation of at least one other household member.

(b) Farming is the secondary activity

Reference person **is** in the labour force (ie at work or unemployed) with a non-farming principal occupation and farming is the principal occupation of at least one other household member.

(c) Farming is the subsidiary activity

Farming is the subsidiary (ie not the principal) occupation of at least one person in the household.

As already explained, households with farming as the principal or secondary activity were excluded from the main Household Budget Survey sample to allow the inclusion of the National Farm Survey households in order to avail of the accurate farming income estimates derived from their twelve months farm accounts records. It was not possible to exclude households where farming was the subsidiary activity. Subsidiary farming activity was, therefore, represented in both the National Farm Survey and Household Budget Survey samples. The 1st stage weighting is designed to correct for differential representation of farming activity by farm size and system. It was applied to all sample households with any level of farming activity - ie all National Farm Survey sample households plus subsidiary farming households co-operating in the main Household Budget Survey.

The first stage weighting system aligns the resulting sub-sample of farming households with the benchmark distribution of farms classified by farm size and system compiled by the Agriculture Division of the Central Statistics Office. This involves the collation of 2004-2005 sample (f) and population (F), frequencies in 49 farm size/system cells and the calculation of proportionate adjustment factors for each cell

$$P_i = \frac{F_i}{\sum F_i} \frac{\sum f_i}{f_i}$$

(2) **Representation of Secondary and Subsidiary Farming Households
(2nd stage weighting)**

In the 3rd stage traditional Household Budget Survey weighting stage, (which is designed to ensure the correct representation of different types of urban and rural households), households where farming is the principal activity are segregated as a separate stratum. As a result of this, households where farming is a secondary and subsidiary activity are included in the rural non-principal stratum. Since subsidiary farming households occurred in both the National Farm Survey and Household Budget Survey sub-samples, the 2nd stage reweighting is designed to ensure the appropriate global representation of:

- (1) Secondary farming household
- (2) Subsidiary farming households
- (3) Non-farming households

within the 3rd stage rural non-farm stratum. Benchmark household counts for the stratum as a whole and for secondary farming households are available from the 2002 Census of Population. Benchmark Census figures are not available for subsidiary farming households (since subsidiary occupation is not covered in the Census). Their frequency is, however, estimated on the basis of the simple average of their incidence in the National Farm Survey and the Household Budget Survey sub-samples. On this basis, overall 2nd stage proportional adjustment factors are estimated for secondary, subsidiary and non farming households within the 3rd stage rural non-principal farming stratum.

(3) **Representation of Urban and Rural Households
(3rd stage weighting)**

In the 3rd stage weighting the complete sample is stratified into 98 cells as follows:

- (a) **Urban households (towns including suburbs with 1,000 or more inhabitants) – 35 cells**
 - Household Composition (7 categories) X Social Group of Reference Person (5 groups)
- (b) **Rural Principal Farming Households – 28 cells**
 - Household Composition (7 categories) X Acreage Farmed (4 groups)
- (c) **Rural Non-Principal Farming Households – 35 cells**
 - Household Composition (7 categories) X Social Group of Reference person (5 groups)

This 3rd stage weighting arrangement is the same as that used in earlier surveys and is equivalent to the approach followed in former surveys subject to the following changes:

- **Town size** (urban areas) and **regional location** (rural areas) were not distinguished as stratifying characteristics to avoid having too many cells with small unstable sub-sample sizes. This is possible because the representation of both these dimensions was controlled in the sample selection and fieldwork design.
- **Household composition** was introduced instead of **household size** to ensure the proper representation of adults and children. The former use of household size as a weighting variable resulted in the under-representation of adults and the over-representation of children, since for households of any

particular size, those with children were far more likely to co-operate than those with more adults (who must each personally co-operate).

- The sample household frequencies in each cell are calculated by using the product of the 1st and 2nd stage proportional adjustment factors for each constituent household instead of counting it as unity. This is the mechanism used to reflect the 1st and 2nd stage farm household weighting adjustments in the derivation of results.

For a particular cell the 3rd stage weight is calculated as the ratio of the proportion of Census of Population 2002 households to the proportion of the post 1st and 2nd stage adjusted sample frequencies in the cell. The original number of co-operating sample households in each cell and the overall proportionate adjustment resulting from the combined effect of the three weighting stages is shown in Appendix 1. The effect of these weights can also be seen in each table where the first line shows the actual number of sample households in the sample for each category distinguished and the second line shows the corresponding adjusted number of sample households after reweighting. The application of the weights in the derivation of results is explained in algebraic form in the following section.

Derivation of Results

Average weekly household expenditure on a particular item for all households in the State (2) has been estimated in surveys prior to 2004-2005 as follows, using only the 3rd stage urban/rural reweighting arrangement described above for the 2004-2005 survey but with Census of Population as base.

where

e_{hi} = average weekly expenditure of i th household in h th stratum

H = total number of strata

n_h = number of sample household in h th stratum

N_h = total number of households in h th stratum

In the 2004-2005 survey, as in the 1999-2000 survey, the first stage reweighting was designed to ensure the proper representation of farming households by farm size/system. It was based on Farm Structure Survey benchmark figures and, therefore, can only be integrated into the Census based third stage weighting system as proportional adjustment P_f . Ideally, if the Census figures were also available for the first stage farm size/system cells within each 3rd stage traditional strata (ie N_{hf} for $f = 1$ to F), the average expenditure would be calculated as follows:

where N_{hf} , n_{hf} , e_{hfi} represent the values of the relevant variables in the f^{th} farm size/system cell **within** the h^{th} stratum. The **unknown** population cell frequency N_{hf} may, using the sample based estimate from the first stage proportional reweighting factors P_f , be estimated as:

where the variable "a" represents the adjusted sample frequencies. On substitution formula (2) becomes:

This is equivalent to the traditional formula (1) except that it incorporates the farm size/system proportional adjustment factor (calculated to also reflect/include the 2nd stage adjustment) and the adjusted sample stratum frequencies resulting from the application of P_f .

Formula (4) is the actual algebraic formulation used in the derivation of the 2004-2005 results for the State. The farm size/system stratification and proportional adjustment do not, of course, apply to non-farming households. This formula, with summation of relevant values of h , is directly applicable for the derivation of estimates for any sub-classifications of households based on the 3rd stage weighting strata. Theoretically, the same formulation can be used to derive expenditure estimates for any other classification of households. For example, to calculate the average weekly expenditure in the j^{th} income range the formula (equivalent to (2) above) should be:

The bracketed symbol [ie (j)] indicates that the associated variable relates to households in the j^{th} income range. However, the population strata frequencies $N(j)_{hf}$ and their sum $N(j)_h$ are not available for individual income ranges and must be estimated.

The assumption is made that the different income ranges are proportionally represented in each first stage farm size/system cells within the 3rd stage stratum and the population cell frequency for the j th income range (ie $N(j)_{hf}$) is on this basis estimated by $N'(j)_{hf}$ where

$$\frac{N'_{(j)hf}}{a_{(j)hf}} = \frac{N_{hf}}{a_{hf}} = \frac{N_h}{a_h}$$

for all values of j . Hence, $N_{(j)}$, the total number of households in the j^{th} income range is estimated by $N'_{(j)}$ where

$$N'_{(j)} = \sum_{h=1}^H \sum_{f=1}^F N'_{(j)hf} = \sum_{h=1}^H \sum_{f=1}^F \frac{N_h}{a_h} a_{(j)hf}$$

Substituting $N'_{(j)hf}$ and $N'_{(j)}$ for $N_{(j)hf}$ and $N_{(j)}$, respectively, formula (5) gives

$$\bar{e}_j = \frac{1}{N'_{(j)}} \sum_{h=1}^H \frac{N_h}{a_h} \left(\sum_{f=1}^F P_f \left(\sum_{i=1}^{n_{(j)hf}} e(j)_{hf} \right) \right) \quad (6)$$

Formula (6) is used in the derivation of all 2004-2005 estimates shown for the different classifications of household distinguished in the tables. It reduces to formula (4) for estimates relating to all households in the State.

The actual or estimated proportion of all households in any sub-classification is given by $N'_{(j)} N$ and the expected frequency of co-operating households is $(N'_{(j)} N)$.

These expected frequencies are the numbers given at the top of each table in the report and described as the adjusted number of households in the sample after reweighting. These adjusted sub-sample frequencies are also the appropriate weights to use in combining sub-classifications together to get a combined estimate.

APPENDIX 4

Changes to Survey Coverage since 1999-2000

The general methodology (ie definitions, scope, coverage etc) of the 2004/2005 Survey is practically identical to that used in the last national Household Budget Survey in 1999/2000. Some changes to the survey coverage were made, these are summarised below:

Household amenities

The question was extended to include conservatories, garden/lawn and attic insulation

Dwelling charges

This question was enhanced to provide specific details on household waste collection charges (public and private), service/maintenance charges, water charges, ground rent and home minder charges

Recreational equipment

The question was extended to include DVD players

Internet Access

The question was enhanced to provide information on the type of internet access (broadband, ISDN and phone link) and related charges.

General health

Questions on long lasting health conditions and any associated difficulties in carrying out every day activities resulting from such conditions were included for every person co-operating with the survey. The question format is exactly similar to that used in the 2006 Census of Population

Expenditure items

The list of expenditure items was considerably enhanced to cater for the changing consumption patterns of households

Household heating

The question was extended to include renewable methods of home heating (eg Solar).

Social Welfare benefits

The questionnaires were amended to include any changes to the type and number of Social Welfare benefits provided

Industry categories for occupations

The basis for coding the industrial activity of respondents has been changed to NACE Rev2 which is the European industrial activity classification.
