

### 3% increase in Number of Visits to Ireland in 2004

There were 6,574,000 Overseas Visits to Ireland in the year 2004, compared with 6,369,000 in 2003, an increase of 3%. The number of Overseas Visits on Cross-Channel Air routes grew by 5% while the number on Cross-Channel Sea routes fell by 6%. In 2004 the number of Overseas Visits on Continental routes increased by 9% on 2003. Although the number of Visits on Transatlantic routes fell by 1% in 2004, the number of Visits by residents of the USA and Canada grew by 8% on 2003. *See Table 3 and Graph*.

The number of Overseas Visits by Irish Residents in the year 2004 was 5,409,000 compared with 4,929,000 in 2003, an increase of 10%. Overseas Visits by Irish Residents on Transatlantic routes increased by 19% and the number on Continental routes grew by 12%. *See Table 13 and Graph.* 

The expenditure figures for the year 2004 show a net outflow of  $\in 104\text{m}$  - earnings from Visitors to Ireland accounted for  $\in 4,076\text{m}$ , while expenditure by Irish Visitors Abroad amounted to  $\in 4,180\text{m}$ . See Table 17.

The Tourism figures in this release also show that:

- ♦ The number of Overseas Visits to Ireland from North America in 2004 was 977,000 compared with 904,000 in 2003, an increase of 8%, although still down on the figure of 1,043,000 in 2000. *See Table 3*.
- ♦ The number of Bednights spent in Ireland by Overseas Visitors in 2004 dropped by 1% when compared with the 2003 figure. *See Table 8*.
- ♦ The average length of stay of Overseas Visits to Ireland during 2004 was 7.5 nights. This compares with an average of 8.5 nights for Irish visits abroad. See Tables 7 and 16.

## **Background Notes**

### Introduction

This annual series gives details on the number of overseas visits to Ireland and Irish visits abroad for the year. It includes data on the reason for journey, average length of stay (nights) and expenditure.

#### **Commercial Drivers**

From the 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2000 Commercial Drivers on sea routes are excluded from visitor numbers.

The agreed European interpretation of Annex 1 of Commission Decision of 9 December 1998 implementing Council Directive 95/57/EC is that commercial drivers should be considered travellers rather than visitors.

One of the fundamental criteria that are used to distinguish a visitor from a traveller is that the *trip should be to a place other than that of the usual environment*. Places that are frequently visited are part of a person's *usual environment* even though they may be located at a considerable distance (or in another country) from the place of residence. Persons who work in means of transport are included in visitor numbers under "Business" unless their trips consist of frequent routine travel, in which case they may be excluded by the *usual environment* criterion.

### Sources

Two sample surveys of passengers, the *Country of Residence Survey* and the *Passenger Card Inquiry*, are carried out by the Central Statistics Office. These are used in conjunction with passenger movement figures supplied by the transport companies to provide estimates for overseas tourism and travel.

Passenger fare payments by non-residents to Irish carriers refer to total fare payments to Irish carriers, that is, including fares for non-Irish travel.

The *Country of Residence Survey* is a continuous sample survey of passengers (both inward and outward) at all major air and seaports to provide an estimated distribution of passengers by country of residence. This distribution is applied to the total passenger movement figures to provide estimates of the numbers of Irish visits abroad and visits to Ireland by non-residents. Visits to Ireland are further categorised into the areas of residence shown in this release. The sample size in the 2004 *Country of Residence Survey* was 585 thousand passengers (290 thousand inward and 295 thousand outward).

The Passenger Card Inquiry is a continuous sample survey of incoming and departing passengers at major air and seaports. This survey provides information on the reason for journey, area of residence, length of stay, expenditure and fare costs. The results are combined with the overall visitor estimates from the Country of Residence Survey to provide the overseas tourism and travel estimates shown in the tables. The sample size in the 2004 Passenger Card Inquiry at air and seaports was 482 thousand passengers (255 thousand inward and 227 thousand outward).

The estimates for cross-border visits on rail and scheduled bus services are derived from the *Passenger Card Inquiry* on rail services and from passenger movement statistics. In this case the *Passenger Card Inquiry* results are used to estimate the country of residence distribution in addition to the reason for journey, average length of stay, expenditure and fare costs. The estimates of expenditure by cross-border visitors using private cars (or un-scheduled bus services) are based on very limited information and must be regarded as subject to error.
