Drogheda, are now, by the 3 & 4 Vict. c. 108, included in the returns of the adjoining counties, viz., Ballymakenny and St. Peter's in the county of Louth, and St. Mary's in the county of Meath; they contain 2,999 persons. The Act 3 & 4 Vict. c. 102, not having yet been carried into effect, they are returned as separate baronies.
